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## County considers ECI work release plan

A proposal to begin a work release program out of the minimum security annex at Eastern Correctional Institution is under consideration by the County Commissioners nearly 14 years after the state agreed not to release prisoners in Somerset County.

The agreement not to run a work release program out of ECI, or to release prisoners who have completed their sentences in the county dates back to its opening in 1987 when anti-prison feelings and

security fears about the new facility were strong.

Since then, ECI has become a major employer in the county and does not have any major security breaches on its record.

"It's proved to be a good neighbor," Warden Robert Kupec told the County Commissioners last week.

If the commissioners agree to let ECI run a work release program out of the annex, the county would have an inexpensive labor pool available to them, Kupec said.

Currently, Deer's Head

Hospital pays inmates from the Poplar Hill Prerelease Unit in Quantico \$4 per day. The State Highway Administration pays them just \$2.60 per day.

Other Poplar Hill inmates work for private employers such as Perdue Farms.

In most cases, the employers are responsible for supervising the inmates at their jobs.

Poplar Hill inmates are already coming into Somerset County each day to work for the State Highway Administration and Maryland State Police, Kupec said.

If the commissioners agree to a program at ECI, Kupec said only inmates who are eligible to be moved into prerelease would be let out for work each day.

Instead of moving them to Poplar Hill or another prerelease facility in the state, they would remain at ECI on work release until their sentences are served.

Currently, the county uses inmates from the Somerset County Detention Center to work at the landfill, at the County Roads Department and in housekeeping jobs.

However, work release at the county jail is limited only to inmates who have been convicted and are serving sentences, which reduces the amount of available labor. The majority of inmates there are still awaiting trial and are ineligible for work release.

A work release program at ECI could be mutually beneficial by providing a larger labor pool to the county, and by giving inmates something to do, Kupec said.

"I don't really like to see idle inmates," he said.

## Police arrest suspect

The search for a homeless man wanted on dozens of theft charges ended last week when an anonymous tipster spotted the suspect inside a Bonanza Steakhouse.

Police said David Lee Ross, 37, seemed relieved during his arrest on March 26.

"He was just kind of hanging out," said Charles Horner, a Maryland State Police trooper assigned to the case. "He was cold and hungry, and he's been cooperative since."

It was unclear where the tip came from, though officers acknowledged the person might have been a diner who recognized Ross from his photograph in the media.

A Bonanza employee who declined to give her name said Ross asked for a cup of coffee while waiting for a relative to pick him up. She said soon after Ross made a phone call, four state troopers arrived and "everything went smoothly."

Ross is charged in a March 9 incident in which a stolen 1984 Buick Century rammed through the doors of a Pocomoke City chicken house. More than 25,000 young birds died when they panicked and piled up in a corner, smothering each other to death.

The car, stolen earlier that week from an elderly couple in Marion Station, was found abandoned.

## Streetscape nears completion

### Work should be finished in April

First the bad news. The bumpity-bumps along Church and Beechwood streets, carved into the asphalt by motorists and work crews the past several months, will likely stay, remnants of downtown's Streetscape revitalization.

Princess Anne town officials can't find the cash to pave the narrow, residential streets, designated alternative routes during much of the massive downtown renovation project.

Officials had looked to State Highway officials and other sources for money to repave the heavily trampled streets. Whether funding will come,

town official Jim Doughty told Town Commissioners at last Wednesday's work session, "I doubt it."

"We are only supposed to repave areas torn up because of conditions created as a result of Streetscape," Doughty said later. "We are paving all streets that were disturbed."

By that he means streets that cross Somerset Avenue from Prince William Street to Linden Avenue. These streets, he said, were unearthed to install underground water lines and storm drains, part of the renovation project.

And bad news for some residents along south Somerset Avenue. They may have to trade their Colonial-style brick walks for concrete. The town is replacing curbs and gutters along south Somerset damaged during the renovation. But not brick walks

that took a beating during construction.

The residents affected are being contacted, Doughty told commissioners, to see if a plan can be worked out.

One cost-cutting idea is a helping hand from inmates at the Somerset County Detention Center, who could assist with the laborious task of repairing the old sections of sidewalk, brick by brick.

"It would take some time, with little expense, but it can be done," Doughty said.

The good news is that the \$2.4 million Streetscape project, which has caused months of interruptions for motorists and downtown businesses, will be completed this month.

The project, dubbed as a "difficult period" by downtown busi-

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## Town to form new search committee

Once again, officials are forming a committee to search for a Princess Anne town hall — but with more eyes this time.

Town commissioners, anticipating a nasty fight with downtown-area citizens over the Landmark Insurance property, voted in a special session last Wednesday to dissolve its town hall search committee of three years to make way for a larger, more diverse panel of participants.

And last Wednesday, commissioners appointed Town Manager John O'Meara to head the new search panel.

If commissioners agree to a model proposed by member James White, at least 15 people from neighborhoods, businesses, the university and former search committee are expected to serve. In contrast, the former five-member search committee included mostly municipal department heads.

"It lends itself to more people than a few people," O'Meara told commissioners, favoring the change. "Representation is imperative."

An April 11 deadline has been established for town residents to apply, O'Meara said. Committee work, which will include research and inspections of land or structures for consideration, will be submitted to commissioners by mid-June. There was no indication as to how members would be selected.

Three years ago, commissioners created a search committee and

## Teackle bond bill is victim of political wrangling

A Senate bill that would have provided funding to the Somerset County Historical Society to continue restoration work at Teackle Mansion and to purchase two properties adjacent to the mansion was killed last week in a partisan fight over the state budget.

However, a companion bill is still alive in the House, where delegates hope it — along with other bond bills for projects in Worcester and Wicomico counties — will survive.

"They are not totally dead," Sen. J. Lowell Stoltzfus, R-38th-Somerset, said Friday.

Stoltzfus was among a handful of Republicans who were informed by the Democratic leadership March 27 that their bond bills were denied because the GOP members would not approve the state budget.

The political maneuvering is nothing new, said Del. K. Bennett Bozman, D-38th-Worcester.

"It's been going on for the 11 years that I've been here," he said. They never vote for the budget, so they never get anything. It's never been an issue in the House side. You have to get some teamwork going if you want to get things done."

The Historical Society's bond bill in the House has already been through two favorable readings and was expected to pass on its third and final reading this week.

Since the Senate bill never made it out of the Budget and Taxation Committee for a vote, it will go to a conference committee where three senators and three delegates will decide its fate.

Del. Norman Conway, D-38th-Wicomico, will be one of the members of the conference committee.

The committee has until midnight April 9 — the end of the General Assembly's session — to work it out. If members cannot reach a decision, the bill will die.

The Historical Society planned to use its bond money to purchase the Sarah Martin Done House behind the Teackle Mansion, as well as a house at 30403 Manokin Ave. which backs up to the Done House.

The properties were to be used for offices, exhibit space, restrooms, meeting rooms and a

gift shop, all of which are currently inside Teackle Mansion.

The money also was to be used to begin preliminary work on a new climate control system for the mansion, and as matching funds for a federal grant.

In addition to the \$300,000 for the Historical Society, other bond bills in danger include \$380,000 for the Worcester County Developmental Center in Berlin, \$375,000 for the Mid-Delmarva YMCA in Pocomoke City, \$50,000 for the Mar-Va Theater Performing

Arts Center in Pocomoke City, and \$350,000 for the Scout Cabin/Community Center in Salisbury.

As one of only 14 Republicans in the Senate, Stoltzfus contends the real issue is partisan politics, not bond bills.

"Either you toe the Democratic line, or you don't get anything," he said Friday.

done in a gravel pit near the Virginia state line five miles from the farm. A broken windshield wiper left on the chicken house floor linked the vehicle to the crime.

Ross also is charged with stealing a military rocket launcher found in a Feb. 24 search of his Shelltown campsite. Technicians with the Maryland State Fire Marshall Bomb Squad took X-rays of the Light Anti-Armor Weapon and determined the 14-inch-long rocket was inert.

Ross' arrest may close a case — or dozens of them stacked in a single file — that have bogged down Worcester County Sheriff's Office investigators for months.

"The file is 6 inches thick," said Lt. Stuart Murray. "It's a relief to us. I imagine a lot of victims are relieved."

Ross' Worcester charges include several counts of misuse of credit cards, fraud and forgery.

"Even with modern-day technology, you can do a lot of damage to someone's credit," Murray said.

By Tuesday afternoon, police had taken Ross twice to

Shelltown's woods, where he stayed in campers and trailers left by hunters. Officers recovered various items Ross is accused of stealing.

"He occupied a lot of man hours and a lot of expense," said Sgt. George Nelson of the Somerset County Sheriff's Office. "A lot of the residents were scared."

Nelson said police responded to "at least a dozen sightings" of Ross in the last three weeks. At least two officers were dispatched for each call, the K-9 units and the state police helicopter also were used, he said.

Ross was wanted on at least 50 charges by the Worcester County Sheriff's Office and at least five charges by Maryland State Police in Princess Anne. Somerset County authorities also wanted Ross for violation of parole and other charges. Police said more charges were likely and the investigation continues.

approved a building fund — which now has \$100,000 — anticipating the relocation of 17 municipal and Police Department personnel from an aging stone structure.

Officials wanted a facility to accommodate town meetings and other large gatherings. Currently, monthly meetings are held at the public library.

Citizens called for a new committee after a February vote by commissioners to pursue the Landmark. Former committee chairman Mike Hall had recommended the south Somerset Avenue property, saying it was ready to move in.

Some citizens charged misconduct and secrecy by commissioners, whom they claimed did not widely publicize their intention. Some criticized the search committee, pointing to Hall as the sole active member. Others pointed to Hall's wife, Beverly, the commission's vice president who favored the Landmark.

Some opponents complained that the Landmark, a modern, single-story complex of attached offices, resembled a chicken house or a strip mall. The building lacks features characteristic of the town's Colonial past, said some, who vowed to oppose the purchase in a voter referendum.

While some commissioners expressed concern that a new panel could slow the search,

although most favor the idea of a diverse group and a harmonious process.

"I support it with sadness; the original committee spent three years presenting properties, and now we're spending more and more time," said Beverly Hall, the sole at-large commission member, said after the session. "We've asked people for their comments, now all of a sudden there's a renewed interest."

Commissioner Frank White said the officials' willingness to start a new search has helped ease tension between citizens and officials. "It was a good meeting; I think we're going in a good direction," he said. "It's OK to disagree, but we can disagree and be digni-

fied." At Wednesday's session, however, officials upheld their decision to forward a letter of intent, which, in effect, requests an option to deposit \$25,000 toward the Landmark's negotiated \$325,000 purchase price if agreements are met.

O'Meara told citizens that the letter carries no financial penalty, calming fears that taxpayers would lose money if the town dropped negotiations.

"The letter of intent expressed interest and can be given to anyone," he said. "Any time the town agrees to purchase anything, (commissioners) put down a downpayment. They have not put down any money yet."

ness leaders, got under way last July and involves replacing water lines and storm drains and installing ornamental street lighting and brick-imprinted sidewalks in the central business district.

The downtown portion of Somerset Avenue, the town's major artery, is a state highway

and eligible for state funds restricted to other affected areas.

"I'm reluctant to give a precise date, but we're talking April, I think," Town Manager John O'Meara told commissioners. "That's as far as I want to go."

Left to be paved are Somerset and Antioch avenues and William and Linden streets. Also, new decorative streetlights along Somerset between Prince William and

Washington streets must be turned on.

Concrete sidewalks, unlike the brick-printed ones in the central business district, will be poured along Somerset from Washington Street to Hampden Avenue if the town can secure additional funds from the State Highway Administration, Doughty said.

Twenty properties in Somerset, Worcester and Wicomico Counties will be among the more than 55 exceptional locations shown statewide throughout the month of April.

Pilgrimage tours represent virtually every period of American history from earliest Colonial times to the present day.

Meandering through three counties in two days, the tour has been organized to include some of the most spectacular 18th and 19th century dwellings and churches in the region, many of which are rarely accessible.

The shared history of the three Lower Shore counties offers an interesting background for this modern day pilgrimage. Situated between the Atlantic Ocean and Chesapeake Bay, the lower Eastern Shore figured prominently in the early history of Maryland. A wealth of surviving 18th and 19th century plantations, farm and town dwellings and churches vividly reflect the past.

Three homes on the tour represent modern day architecture; one an interpretation of the Craftsman-style home, another displays artifacts and artwork reflecting various Native American tribes and the third has vineyards that produce many varieties of both red and white grapes.

- 1 light pint flour

- Run tansy through food processor, then press through strainer. Cream butter and sugar, beat egg yolks and white separately. Mix all together. Prepare like pancakes, serving with butter. Add sugar on top.

**ECI work release plan deserves consideration**

The fact that Eastern Correctional Institution Warden Robert Kupec's proposal to the County Commissioners to begin a work release program out of the minimum-security annex at the prison received no objection should seem surprising to anyone who remembers the open hostility toward ECI before its opening in the summer of 1987.

Residents' fears about having a large state prison in their small rural Eastern Shore county were calmed only slightly when state officials agreed not to run a work release program out of ECI, or to release prisoners who had completed their sentences in the county.

Over the years as more and more county residents went to work there, the fears subsided. As Kupec told the County Commissioners, "It's proved to be a good neighbor."

With the county's collective adjusted attitude in mind, Kupec thinks it's time to take a look at running a work release program out of the Westover facility.

Such a program could be mutually beneficial by providing a larger, inexpensive labor pool to the county, and by giving inmates something productive to do.

According to Kupec, inmates from Poplar Hill Pre-release Unit in Quantico are already coming into Somerset County each day to work for the State Highway Administration and Maryland State Police.

The County Commissioners have agreed to consider Kupec's proposal.

Whether there are still some fears in the community about the prison and the release of inmates — even if only during working hours — remains to be seen. But it is a plan that deserves consideration.

**SOMERSET SOUNDINGS** By Joe Mangini

I would like to tell you about an event that the Somerset County Economic Development Commission participated in during the last week.

This event involved the McCready Health Services Foundation and the city of Crisfield. The situation is this: The Alice B. Tawes Nursing Home operated by the McCready Health Services Foundation and located in the city of Crisfield, needs to be upgraded and enlarged to enhance the services it provides to its patients.

Under the dedicated leadership of CEO Allen Bickling, the foundation is putting together a six-year capital improvement program that would, once undertaken, accommodate the needs of the Lower Eastern Shore residents.

In order to accomplish this ambitious and very worthwhile project, funding is necessary to complete this project. Dr. Bickling and the staff of McCready are pursuing those avenues of funding with the utmost urgency. This included approaching the state's General Assembly.

Sen. Lowell Stoltzfus introduced a bill in the Legislature that would authorize an appropriation of \$1.8 million from the Cigarette Restitution Fund to help offset the costs of the upgrade, renovation, and construction of an addition to the Alice B. Tawes Nursing Home.

On March 22, a contingent of enthusiastic citizens from the city of Crisfield that included the mayor, City Council, city manager, chief of police, dedicated and concerned residents, as well as nursing home staff traveled to Annapolis to testify on behalf of Sen. Stoltzfus' bill.

The bill was before the Senate's Budget and Taxation Committee chaired by Sen. Barbara Hoffman from the city of Baltimore.

Sitting on the committee was our own Sen. Stoltzfus and a very good friend of mine from Charles County, Sen. Thomas "Mac" Middleton.

Now, you are all wondering why was the SCEDC involved? Well, we were requested to attend the hearing by the Crisfield Area

Chamber of Commerce to support the bill on behalf of Crisfield, the foundation, and for economic development. There was no hesitation from me that we at the SCEDC should be there.

Well, I must tell you that my part was very minimal compared to the performances and presentations given by the others in the party. I basically informed the Senate committee that we from Economic Development were there to render moral support for the Alice B. Tawes Nursing Home and the city of Crisfield, that the project was deserving of their support because it enhanced the quality of life, an item that impacts on the issue of economic development.

The rest of the group from Crisfield who testified and spoke to the Senate committee in support of the Alice B. Tawes Nursing Home were outstanding! Their comments were well presented, filled with emotion, and the whole performance was organized so well by Dr. Bickling that the chair of the senate committee complimented the group on its

presentation.

I must say, as a newcomer to the area, I was impressed and very proud of all those folks from Crisfield who took the time to attend the hearing and speak. If success for this project does not come this year, I can almost positively say that a good impression was made, the senators were impressed and gave moral support to the project. If the funding does not come this year, I am certain that success can be attained in the next session!

**Take another look at metal frames**

As framers, we don't really mean to "metal" in your choices, or do we? Do you wish your art to be exhibited in your home or office as "high-end," "mid-range," or "economically framed"? Do you wish conservation framing? Do you want to make a good impression with your office decor, or simply just place art on a wall to have a space filled?

If your goal is to lose weight, you will not spend breaks eating pastries. Likewise, a good impression is not something to be taken lightly. "There are no second chances at making a good first impression." And they are lasting.

For years, the general public has thought that art should only be framed in wood to make that best, first impression. If you still hold steadfast to that idea, perhaps you need to rethink your ideas.

There are framers who are so sure the public does not like metal frames, that they don't stock them. Wrong move. Chain stores are stealing your business, especially when it comes to poster framing. And with the recent increase in wood moulding prices, metal frames can not only

be more economical, but the "metal frame of yesteryear bears very little resemblance to the metal frame of today," say Jay Goltz, CPF, journalist, and instructor.

There is a much larger selection of profiles, architectural designs, colors, finishes (including cross-hatched and frosted) which give a whole new meaning to metal frames.

Statistically, 10 to 15 percent of all art should be in a metal frame. Not carrying metal frames cuts into a profit/loss statement. Frames are like today's fashion in shirt design. The design is more important than what it is made from.

Kenneth Cole is one of the hottest labels in shirts. Their newest line contains many polyesters. The rule that a good shirt must be 100 percent cotton does not seem to apply these days.

People buy design. A beautifully framed picture in a metal frame is just that — a beautifully framed picture.

If you remember what metal frames used to be, you may not

tend to be as open-minded. Today's metal profiles are as numerous as their finishes and the ability to use several together (stackable) as well as independently.

Do I really mean to metal? You betcha! Should you? You may find it more impressive than you once thought.

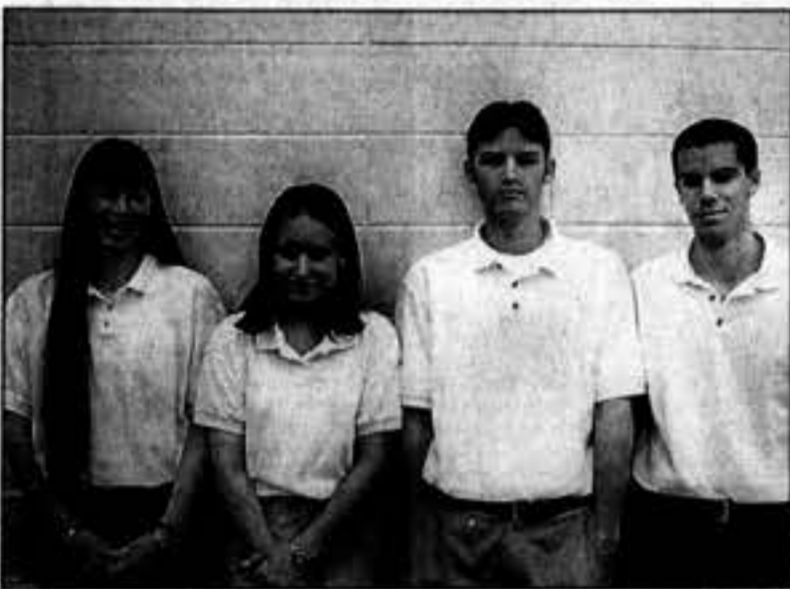

## Police charge man in assault

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## Bill seeks money to study erosion

Senator Paul S. Sarbanes (D-MD), joined by Senators John Warner (R-VA) and Barbara A. Mikulski (D-MD), are requesting Senate approval of a comprehensive water resource study to examine the shoreline erosion problem of the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries. The study, if approved, would be conducted by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in conjunction with other federal, state, and local agencies.

Shoreline erosion around the more than 7,000 miles of tidal shoreline along the Chesapeake

Bay and its tributaries amounts to approximately 4.7 million cubic yards of shoreline material being deposited into the Chesapeake Bay annually. This results not only in serious property damage, but also contributes millions of cubic yards of sediment annually to the Bay. According to the Senators, "This sediment adversely affects the Bay's water quality, destroys valuable wetlands, and habitat and clogs the Bay's navigational channels."

With the Chesapeake 2000 interstate Bay Agreement calling

for sediment reduction in each of the major tributaries of the Chesapeake Bay, the Senators are asking the Corps to examine the environmental impacts of shoreline erosion and the increasing sedimentation of the Bay in an effort to improve the overall environmental quality of the Chesapeake Bay.

The study must be approved by the Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works. Once approved funding must be secured for the initiation of the study work by the Corps of Engineers.

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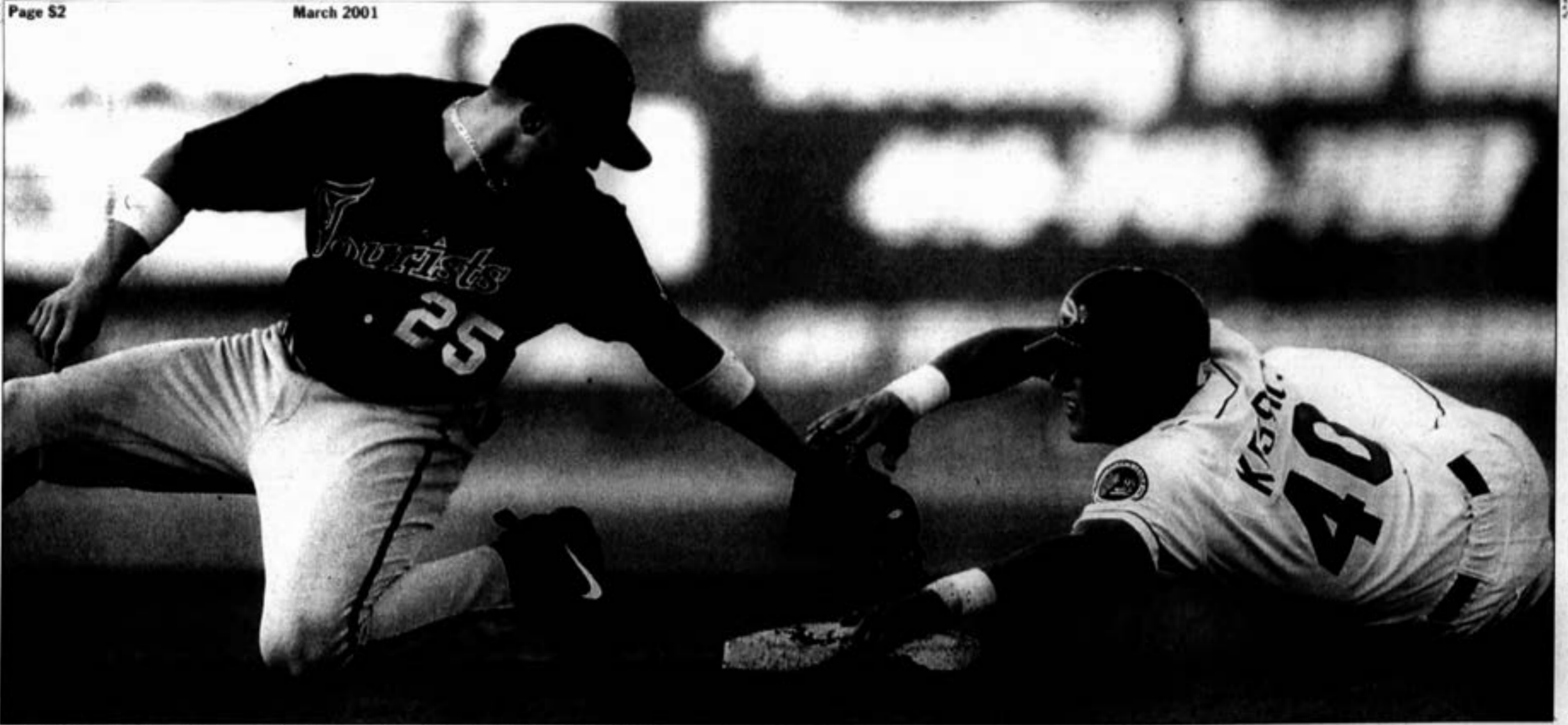

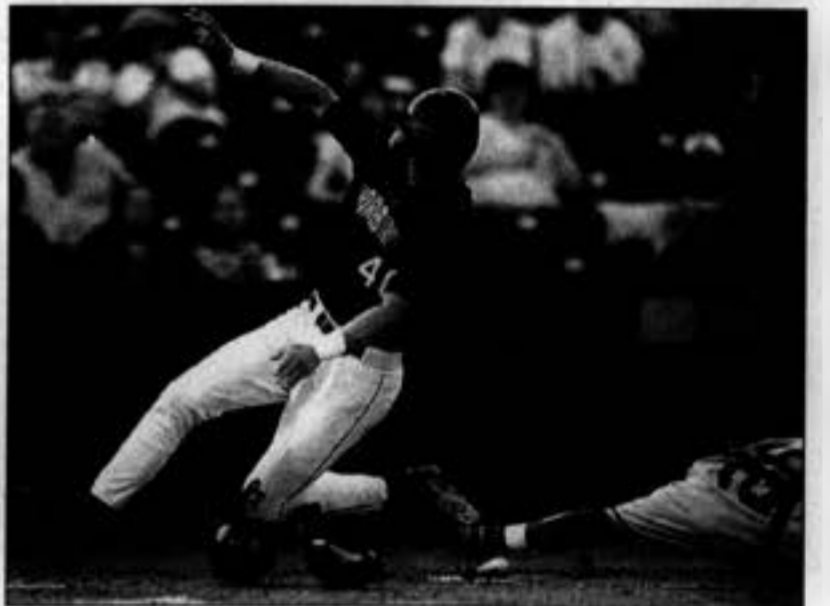

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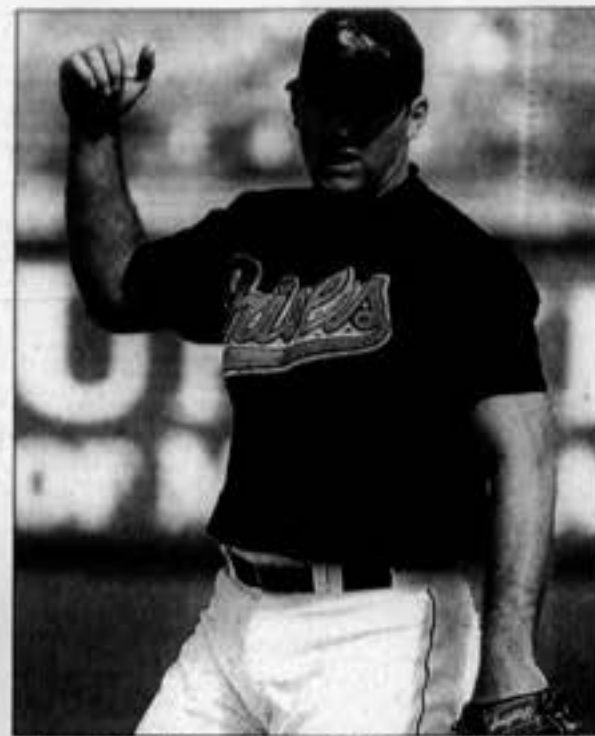
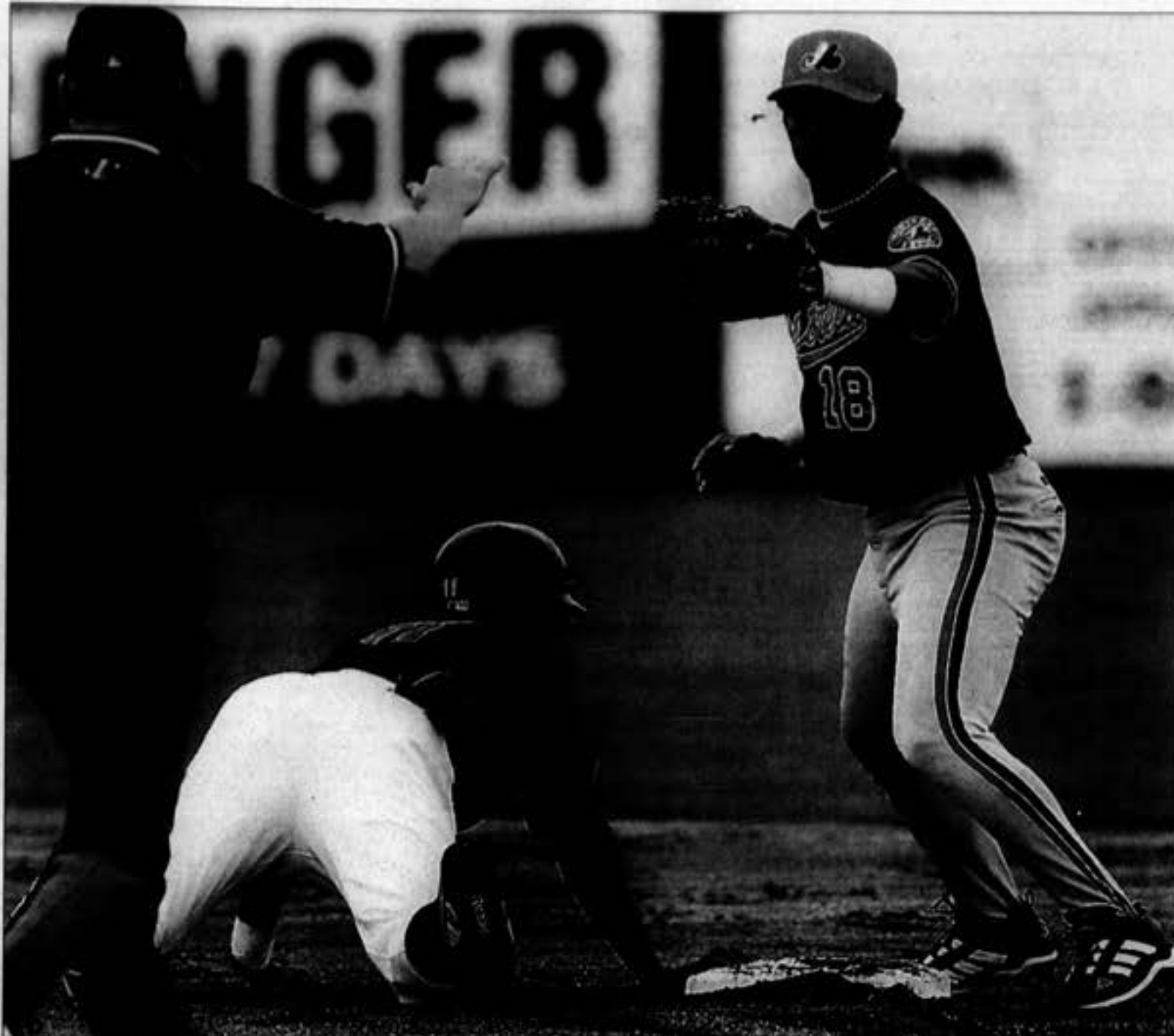

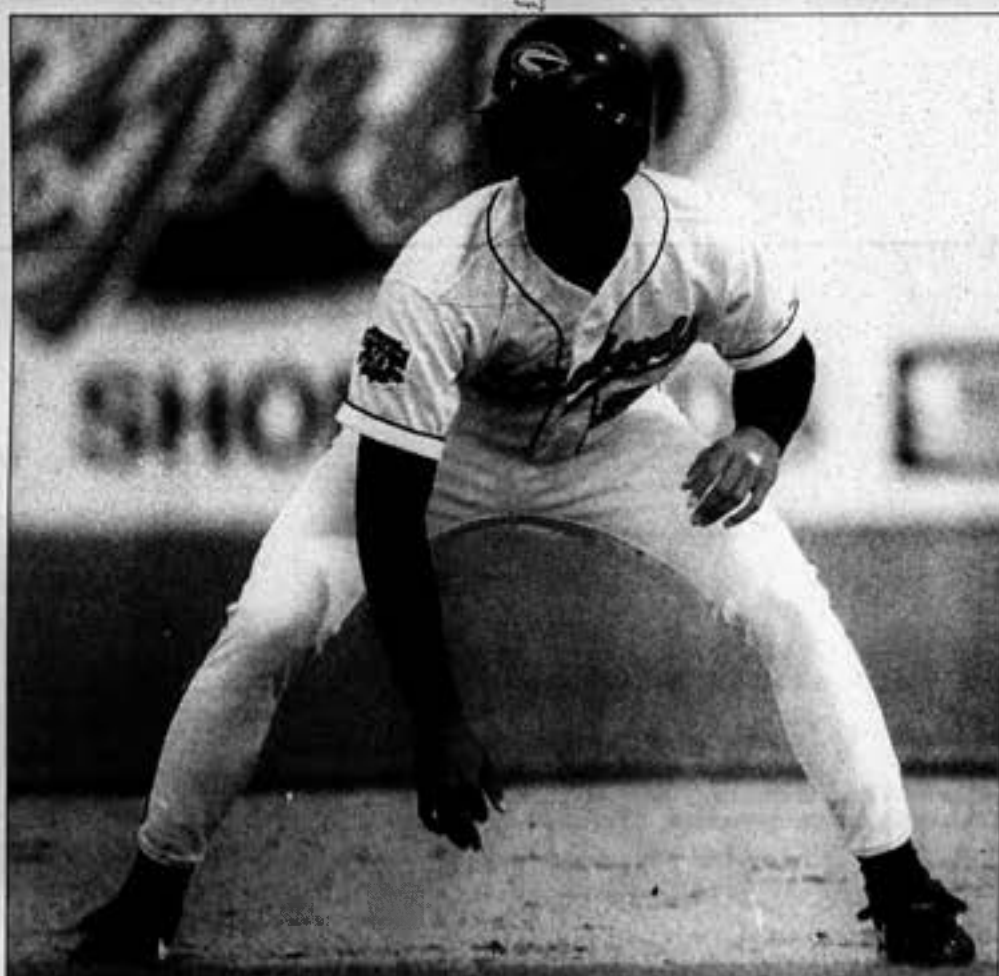

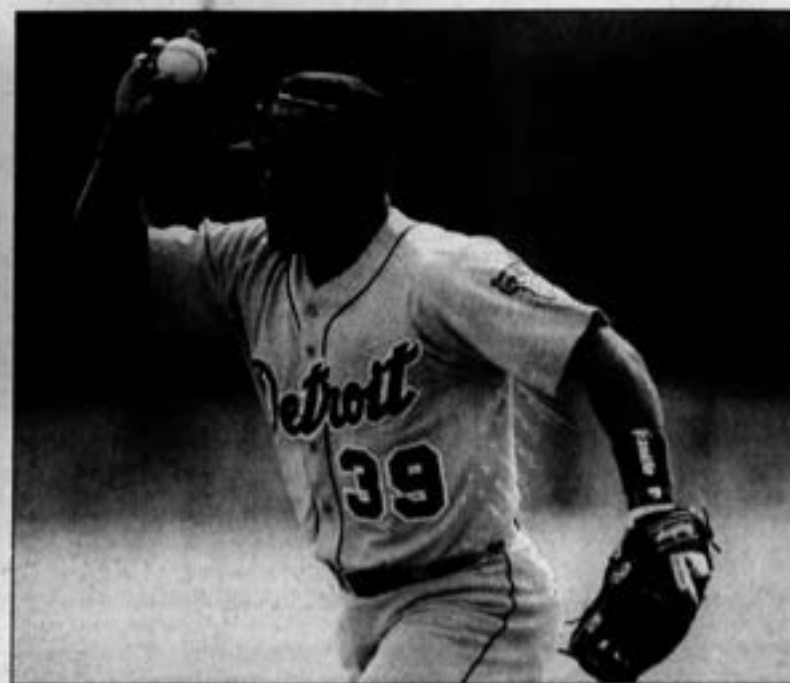

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# Hall resigns town commissioner seat

Princess Anne Town Commissioner Beverly Hall, the panel's lone at-large member, will resign from her post April 30, two months before completing her third year in office.

Hall announced her resignation at Monday's town meeting, citing plans to move to Round Rock, Texas, near Austin, where her husband, Mike, has accepted a job transfer at Dresser Industries' headquar-

ters. The couple, who live in Hayman's Purchase, are planning a mid-May move.

News of Hall's resignation has stirred talk about a replacement, and commissioners on Monday agreed to discuss at a work session later this month a procedure in selecting someone to complete her term.

The panel is also expected to decide when to elect a new vice president.

Under the town charter, a special election must be held for a replacement if commissioners don't appoint someone to complete the term within 40 days of Hall's resignation, Town Manager John O'Meara said.

An administrative assistant at NASA on Wallops Island, Va., for 14 years, Hall was elected to a four-year term in June 1998. She was elected

vice president last year.

During her three years as a town commissioner, Hall helped steer the \$2.4 million downtown revitalization project, called Streetscape, scheduled for completion this month.

The centerpiece of her tenure as a commissioner, she says, is the take-home police car policy. Her advocacy for take-home police cars helped push the recently adopted policy that enables full-time police officers to take home cruisers.

"I am enthused with the

Police Department and its officers, and whatever I felt I could do to further its cause, I did," Hall said earlier. "It is wonderful that we are able to get people of this caliber in this small city."

As the only woman on the five-member panel, Hall said she would like her replacement to be a woman. "I think it's very important for a woman to continue in this position in politics," she said.

## Town makes 'Clean Sweep'

Town Manager John O'Meara shows no mercy for owners of properties weighed with trash.

Since his Operation Clean Sweep went into full steam last week, 12 properties in Princess Anne have been either warned or cited for outdoors sanitation and code enforcement violations.

Another, on Chammore Way, severely vandalized and vacant, and frequented by teens, was condemned.

"There's no forgiveness, no mercy," he said. "Go to church for mercy. At Town Hall, we don't give any slack."

He has even set aside a day to devote exclusively to unkempt properties, he announced at Monday's town meeting.

"Each Wednesday at Town Hall is Clean Sweep Day," O'Meara told town commissioners. On this day, reports on properties declared a public nuisance are examined, violation notices are written and processed and owners located.

Property owners in violation of the town's sanitation and safety codes are warned to fix the problem or face a citation. Owners who don't comply cited and face a fine. Noncompliance leads to property condemnation. No excuses.

"We're unrelenting; we don't negotiate with landlords who don't behave," he said. "We're not slowing things down, even within the hours of coming into compliance."

## County school officials look for ways to trim budget

By DEBORAH GATES

With a proposal to spend \$21.4 million on elementary and secondary schools next year expecting the fiscal knife, school officials have suggested scaling back programs before the spending package is formally adopted next week.

"There is nothing here that is not important," School Board Chairman Richard Scott said last week at a public hearing on the budget. "But the pie is so small. This by no means is meant to simplify, but (cutting the budget) is like a parent and kids looking

at a Sears book; it's tough to make the decision."

Supporters of the board's budget — mostly elementary and secondary principals — attended the hearing and lobbied officials for budget inclusions ranging from school nurses to roof repairs. Most who spoke held firm on earlier requests for technology, elementary vice principals and enhancements in vocational education.

"You're including technology, which is very important especially at the high school level," said Louise Cheek, principal at Washington High School.

"Technology training for teachers is included. That's also important."

Stan Pruitt, principal at Princess Anne Primary, wanted assurance that school nurses, part of a health services budget request for \$174,000, don't come under the cutting knife. The board is asking county officials to increase spending on nurses to help offset a cut in funding by the Health Department that helped pay salaries of nurses at each of the county's 11 schools.

"We had a student with dia-

Owned by Paul Thornton, the 5.3-acre site that backs up to houses on Linden and Beckford Avenues on the north and east, and Greenwood Garden Apartments on the south, will eventually have 22 semi-detached single-family houses.

Although a forest conservation plan has been approved for the site, Thornton must still get approval for his preliminary and final plats for the development from the county's Planning Commission, according to Joan Kean, director of the county's Department of Technical and Community Services.

Thornton, who also recently bought the Princess Anne Flower Shop and the house next to it, is calling the new subdivision Kilkenny Court after his hometown in Ireland.

The land is zoned Residential-2 and is outside the town limits.

## Man hospitalized after street brawl

A latenight brawl that resumed several hours after it began left one North Carolina man hospitalized and a Crisfield man in jail.

The Crisfield Police Department responded to a fight on Fourth Street at 3:15 a.m. April 1, said Sgt. Jeff McCready.

An argument had taken place earlier in the evening between Jason Dwight Sutton, 18, of Crisfield and Brian Veeney, 26, of St. Morrisville, N.C.

When the two met again, Sutton allegedly pulled a knife and a night stick on Veeney, and stabbed him repeatedly in the lower groin, cutting a major vein.

While bleeding profusely, Veeney took the night stick and "Started beating Sutton with his own weapon," McCready said.

"The victim was three or four times bigger than the suspect," he said. "The victim was like 6 feet 4 inches and about 300 pounds."

Friends took Veeney to McCready Memorial Hospital before an ambulance or police

arrived, Sgt. McCready said. He was transported to Peninsula Regional Medical Center in Salisbury for emergency surgery.

"I'm doing a lot better now," Veeney said from his hospital bed.

Sutton faces multiple charges including attempted second-degree murder, first-degree assault, reckless endangerment, disorderly conduct, two counts of using a deadly weapon with intent to injure, two counts of concealing a deadly weapon, affray, and malicious destruction of property.

He was held at the Somerset County Detention Center on \$500,000 bond.

Sutton is scheduled to appear in court April 19 for a preliminary hearing on the misdemeanor charges and April 20 for the felony charges.

If convicted on all charges, Sutton could face more than 60 years in jail.

The stone is rolled away

Some women walked through the first light of day. These women had a problem. They were going to anoint the body of Jesus of Nazareth, but a huge stone blocked the entrance to the tomb.

They were asking among themselves: "Who will roll away the stone for us from the door of the tomb?"

When they got there they were greatly surprised. Looking up they saw that the stone was rolled back; for it was very great.

Easter, now as then, unblocks entrances and rolls stones away. Blocked entrances are one of the

problems of life. A huge stone stands between where we are and where we want to be.

Frequently we feel trapped, but just beyond the entrance there is light. It is a beautiful spring day with flowers blooming and birds singing. But we are held in darkness. At the entrance, stand family, friends and neighbors, hoping for some good news. We would go to them, but we can't. We are trapped in our loneliness.

The pathway to light, freedom, and those we love most is blocked. Sometimes we have the sense of standing outside, wanting to be inside. Some truth, some joy, some relationship we would enter upon, but we can't. We would go in, but

we are shut out. The entrance is blocked.

It is little wonder then that Christian faith is concerned about unblocked entrances, and open doors. Jesus said, "I am the door; if any one enters by me, he shall be saved, and he will go in and out and find pasture" (John 10:9).

John hears God saying to the church at Philadelphia, "Behold, I have set before you an open door, and no man can shut it" (Revelation 3:8).

There is some real sense in which this is what Easter is all about. It unblocks entrances, rolls away stones, and sets before us open doors that the mightiest powers of earth can never shut.

The group plans to use this year's bond money to purchase the Sarah Martin Done House behind the Teackle Mansion for \$150,000, as well as a house at 30403 Manokin Ave. for \$59,900. The properties will be used for offices, exhibit space, restrooms, meeting rooms and a gift shop, all of which are currently inside the Teackle Mansion.

The money also will be used to begin preliminary work on a new climate control system for the mansion, and as matching funds for a federal grant.

In addition to the \$235,000 for the Historical Society, other Lower Shore bond bills that passed

House kills McCready bill

A bill that would have provided \$1.8 million in cigarette restitution money to the McCready Foundation was killed in the House of Delegates because the money has already been allocated to local health departments, according to Sen. J. Lowell Stoltzfus, R-38th-Somerset.

Stoltzfus said he withdrew a companion Senate bill after the

betes and the nurse prevented the student from going into diabetic shock. I don't know what we'd have done if we had not had a nurse," he said.

Superintendent Michael Thomas said that providing nurses for the system's schools was a priority and that money proposed to retain them is not likely to be cut. "Two years ago we worked very

hard to get nurses in the schools," he said. "They are a high priority." Likely to be scaled back, though, are the more than \$600,000 in capital improvements. "Some capital improvement items we might want to move on while some we might want to hold off on," he said.

Which proposed budget items remain and which are deferred will be announced at its regular meeting April 17, when the Board of Education is scheduled to formally

adopt a budget for county approval. The budget will be forwarded to the County Commissioners in late April.

Specifically, the Board of Education wants County Commissioners to approve \$10.1 million, a 12.8 percent increase over this year's allocation, and about half in total proposed spending.

The state has awarded the school system \$11.2 million and projected a slight increase over this year's spending.

The county is expected to vote on its share by June. Between now and then, Thomas said, will save school officials the grueling task of cutting later.

"We may be trimming between now and the next meeting to adopt," he said.

violations, which elected officials complain are often ineffective.

"People have lost faith in the system. It is a long drawn-out process," Commissioner Garland Hayward said. "They feel that it's no use complaining because nothing is being done about the problem."

In contrast, Clean Sweep is systematic, O'Meara said. Not only do officials respond to citizens' complaints, law enforcement officers and Public Works personnel are routinely canvassing communities for violators.

The town is also working with county officials and the Maryland State Police in targeting property violations in communities adjacent to the town limits, such as the Greenwood section just south of Princess Anne.

Eventually, officials plan to publicly expose violators by pub-

lishing citations and convictions in the newspaper.

In addition, through a partner program on Saturdays, Public Works supervises a group of county Detention Center inmates on work release canvassing communities for trash strewn along curbs and gutters.

Since the program began about two weeks ago, 62 tons of trash and debris have been collected and hauled. "It's starting to add up to a big difference for us," O'Meara said.

Meanwhile, town commissioners are calling for enforcement of garbage collection fees, which are due in July. Some town residents fail to pay the annual \$50 trash pick-up fee, yet have trash collect-

ed. "We want the ball picked back up on that," Hayward said.

- 2 eggs
- 3 mashed bananas
- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda

Cream butter and sugar, add beaten eggs, mash bananas with potato masher and add to mixture.

Sift flour, measure, then sift flour and soda together. Add to mixture. Add nuts and vanilla. Pour into 1 large loaf pan or sometimes 1 double and use a 13 by 9 pan or 3 small loaves.

Bake slow at 250 or 275 degrees for 45 to 60 minutes, maybe longer, until done in middle.

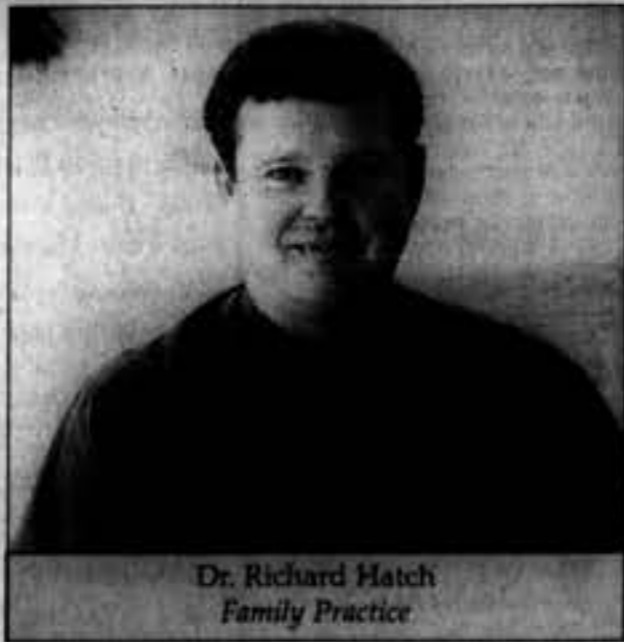

wife, Karen (his college sweetheart), his 16-year-old son, Danny, and his brother James.

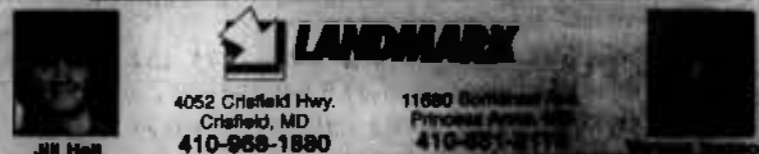

Is anyone doing research?

Editor: Crabs, Rockfish, Oysters. Everyone is complaining, is anyone doing some basic research?

I do a lot of writing. I also do a lot of questioning at the "basic" level. At my request DNR sent me a "history" of crabbing 1920-1994 and rockfish from 1920-1998, most interesting.

Who among either the general public or the "hunters," watermen, have gone back to see how we arrived at where we are? If you don't know where you have been, and are not sure where you are, how are you going to know how to get to where you want to go? Or, things that don't change remain the same?

Things have changed. Licenses for commercial crabbing started in 1943, permit for crabbing was 35 pots. DNR crab history: "1994 42,306,198 pounds. Fishing pressure has increased dramatically in just the past three years, from 94,400 pots in 1991 to 130,000 pots in 1994."

I have been unable to find anyone, including the scientific world, who can tell me what specific species of algae a crab eats the day it hatches (the crab is only 0.250 mm and at that stage. It is NOT a scavenger. Does not even look like a crab.), if that food supply is in the water, what the required cells per milliliter are, what the nutrient requirements are to grow the algae, or if those nutrients are in the water.

Yes, Senator Fowler and other environmentalists want to see their feet in the water, check the yearly "wade-in" activities, thus the nutrients which grow the algae to feed the crab and all microscopic zooplankton must be reduced. For the past 13 years every effort has been made by the Chesapeake Bay Agreements, using my favorite term, to "starve the elephant." It is working. Not much can live in the clear water in a bathtub.

The environmentalists causing the starvation are not recognized,

the nice point about creating starvation, you can brag without being challenged. The regulators and those being regulated are at each others throats. Rockfish? When for lack of nutrients those necessary specific species of algae (the "weed" species soak up the nutrients first, ask any farmer) no longer exist to feed the prey fish the rockfish originally fed on, the rockfish changed their diet?

Heavens, the rockfish are eating all the crabs! Hunger causes strange things to happen.

This is not a new phenomena. Lake Ontario, circa 1990, suffered the same fate the Chesapeake Bay is beginning to suffer. No algae, no fish. No one in the Chesapeake Bay area was looking there, then or now.

Why am I "the lone ranger?" My suggestion to both the regulators and the hunters, sorry, watermen, is to turn loose of each others throats, do some basic research. You may have to suffer some losses, oysters, in one area but gain in another. Besides, by changing from "hunters" to "growers" of oysters the potential is many times greater than the hunter/gather system. 500+ bushels per acre versus 1 (DNR's 290,000 acres produces 300,000 bushels).

Assuming, of course, you can convince the environmental community to give up seeing their feet so the critters have something to eat. Yes, crabbers, you have a problem but you are picking on the wrong people and the wrong problem.

I disagree with the watermen in many ways. I'm a farmer not a hunter. I do respect their hard work and many other aspects of their life, especially their independence and fierce challenges to its being limited. If we all had that same desire to remain free, many of the regulations and restrictions now placed on use of nutrients would not exist.

Shore conservation projects get federal funds

Senators Paul S. Sarbanes and Barbara A. Mikulski announced that the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation has awarded grants totaling \$162,200 for two Chesapeake Bay conservation projects on the Eastern Shore.

The funding for these grants are supported through Congressional appropriations, federal agency agreements, and private funding from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

The following two projects will be funded by these grants:

• \$101,100 will provide for a second year of funding for a nutria eradication project at the Blackwater Wildlife Refuge in Dorchester County. In addition to stemming the nutria population, this project strives to restore marsh habitats, and promote pub-

lic understanding of the importance of preserving Maryland's coastlines. The information gathered from this project will be shared with other state and federal resource managers who are facing marsh degradation problems due to nutria.

• \$60,100 in funding to restore two oyster beds in each of the six Oyster Recovery Areas designated by the Oyster Roundtable Action Plan on the Eastern Shore. The initial work will be done to identify sites and begin planting oysters. This effort will provide a strong base for the collective efforts of bringing healthy oyster populations back to the Chesapeake Bay, which is a priority of the Chesapeake Bay 2000 Agreement.

The future of the bay and its watermen

At this point in time, we are at a crisis in the management of Chesapeake Bay resources. Current regulatory policies regarding the harvesting of crabs and other marine resources are threatening the livelihoods of several thousand men and women in the Chesapeake Bay country who follow the water. Management policies to control the fishing effort in the Bay are so far removed from reality that it would be a joke if the consequences were not so dire.

Put yourself in our gumboots and consider these developments taking place on the Bay and think whether you could abide by them.

Would you like to have your work hours controlled to a period of 6:15 a.m. to 2:15 p.m., where working beyond that period would be breaking the law? Would you like to be told by a state agency that you can only work a total of 48 hours a week during a season that lasts only 180 days for putting groceries on the family table?

Would you be worried and angry with a law that forces watermen to go out on the Bay

when there are thunderstorms, heavy seas, or dense fog because they have to work within the hour limitations of the day?

How would you feel if you were blamed for the environmental developments affecting the Bay that were beyond your control?

Lastly, how would you feel if you were part of the only group to be seriously regulated in your industry or way of life?

The Chesapeake Bay watermen and the businesses that serve them are ready to shoulder their fair burden of the Bay's conservation effort. What they resent is being targeted by the bureaucrats of the Bay management program as the easiest sector to manage because they lack the clout of powerful, well-connected social and political organizations in Maryland and the Bay country. Watermen don't have lobbyists in Armani suits defending them in Annapolis. Recently, at great cost to individual watermen, the Save-the-Waterman Coalition raised \$50 apiece from concerned watermen who were fed up with the existing policies. For a waterman, that's a lot of money. It was enough for us to hire a lawyer to confront state agen-

cies on these matters.

We have stated our position over and over. It seems that no one is listening to us in Annapolis. We shall not be deterred, however. We will keep presenting our science and our facts till we are treated honestly and fairly by the Department of Natural Resources and other state agencies. Here is what we want:

1. We want regulation and licensing of so-called recreational crabbers. They are taking record amounts of crabs from the Bay each season. We estimate that they are taking one-half of the crab supply. The image of the tourist using a chicken neck to catch a few crabs is misleading and inaccurate.

2. We want the Rockfish conservationists and the sports fishing industry to shoulder their share of the Bay preservation burden by opening up the Bay to increased fishing. Rockfish are crab predators that gobble up 72 million crabs a year. We want the state to increase the catch limits of charter boats to help diminish the rampant over-supply of croaker fish in the Bay which also prey heavily on Bay crab populations.

3. We want environmental

policy makers to take a closer look at how sewer systems are flooding Bay waters with effluent that kills marine life. We want a serious curtailment of mosquito spraying over crab grounds and marshes. Mosquito spraying kills crabs and greatly increases the mortality of peeler crabs for the soft-shell crab watermen.

4. Finally, we want a sensible science-based conservation policy for the Bay fisheries that the watermen can understand and work with. We want to see for ourselves how the science is arrived at which limits our licensed right to harvest the fishery. We want peer-reviewed science that is free from the kind of political and social agendas that the bureaucrats in Annapolis seem so intent on foisting on us.

Finally, we want a Chesapeake Bay that we can pass on to our children in terms of living and working in one of God's prettiest areas. Watermen are the salt of the earth. If they vanish, how will our precious Bay be savored?

Each year in the United States, almost one million adolescents become pregnant. Closer to home, the number of births to teens under the age of 20 was 46. This figure represents 18.5 percent of the total births in the county. In order to lower teenage birth rates, teens need to be educated about sex and the consequences of pregnancy.

Why is teen pregnancy such an important issue? Studies have

shown that children born to teenage mothers are more likely to suffer health, social and emotional problems. Children of adolescent mothers are more likely to face additional challenges than the offspring of mothers age 20 or 21.

It has been reported that the children of teen mothers are more likely:

1. to be born prematurely and be low birthweight babies
2. to have health problems
3. to be physically abused,

abandoned, or neglected

4. to have trouble in school
5. to drop out of school
6. to become mothers themselves before the age of 18.

The problem of adolescent pregnancy touches all aspects of society and any solution to this problem must involve the entire community.

Here in Somerset County, we believe in our youth and have a desire to help them maximize their potential and lead productive

lives.

This is the reason that the Somerset County Health Department, area organizations, community leaders, and the local Management Board have combined efforts to form the Youth Development Program, for Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention. Their mission is to develop a coordinated community-wide program aimed at adolescent pregnancy prevention and mobilizing resources to make changes

through the use of multiple resources.

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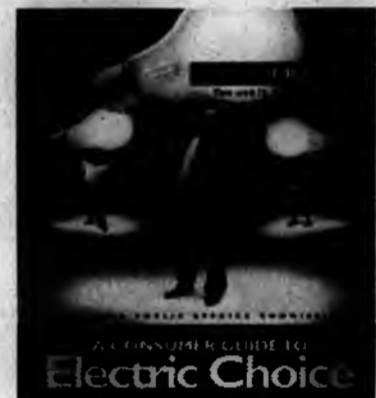

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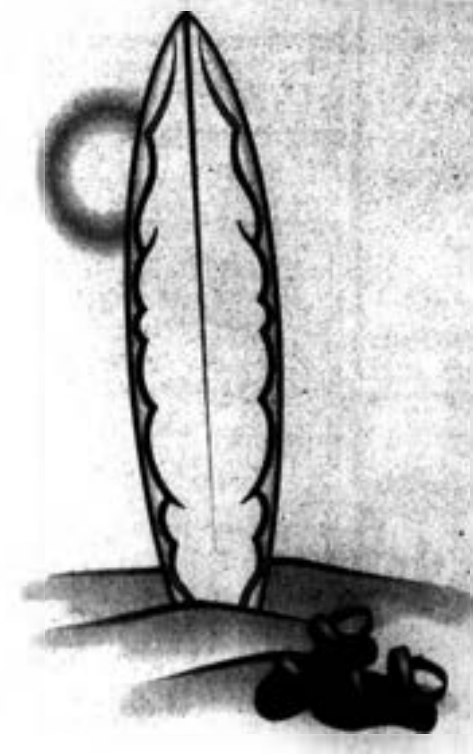

## Streetscape work nears end

If rainy weather can hold off for a few more days, Princess Anne's Streetscape project that started last May could be completed by this weekend.

"Things are picking up, and by the weekend, we'll be in good shape as far as streets to be paved," said town official Jim Doughty, who is overseeing the \$2.4 million project. "We have to do a final walk through, make final payments, put together odds and ends. But come Saturday, Somerset Avenue should be paved."

Between now and then, though, motorists may be slightly inconvenienced. Starting today, the State Highway Administration will

begin paving Somerset Avenue from Front Street at the Manokin River Park to Hampden Avenue at the District Court building.

Between today and Saturday, when paving is scheduled, parking is prohibited in sections along Somerset, the town's main artery, he said.

"Motorists will be able to drive through, but not park," he said. "Parking will be permitted as sections are completed."

Meanwhile, David G. Horsey & Sons of Laurel, the Streetscape contractor, is pouring concrete around a few remaining drain inlets and gutters. Paving along William Street to Church Street and along Linden Avenue to

## Officials look for ferry funding

Encouraged by preliminary feasibility studies on running a car ferry between Crisfield and St. Mary's County,

state transportation officials are now looking at whether there is federal money available to subsidize a ferry during the winter months.

While state officials estimate a ferry could make as many as 12 trips a day across the bay in warmer weather, the need could be reduced to just two a day in the off season, said Del. Charles McClenahan, R-38th-Somerset.

"We don't know whether it's going to work or not," he said.

State officials plan to turn to U.S. Reps. Wayne Gilchrest and Steny Hoyer — who represent the Eastern Shore and Southern Maryland, respectively — for help in looking for federal money, McClenahan said.

The State Department of Transportation and the Department of Business and Economic Development have spent the past year identifying potential commuters and tourists who would be likely to take a ferry across the 25-mile stretch of water, as well as the cost to operate a ferry.

## Officials mull water, sewer expansion plan

A proposal to extend water and sewer services down Deal Island Road to Goose Creek — due to a high number of failing septic systems in the area, as well as a planned unit development proposed for Anderson Road — is under consideration by the County Commissioners who will hold a public hearing on the issue.

The hearing to amend the county's Comprehensive Water and Sewer Plan will be held at 7 p.m. on May 8 in the commissioners office at the Somerset County Office Complex in Princess Anne.

The proposal is in line with the county's comprehensive plan which channels new development in growth centers.

If approved, the plan would allow the county's Sanitary Commission to run water and sewer lines to Brownstone, Kemp Nursery, Clarence Barnes, Irving Bouch and Anderson roads.

In the recent past, the commissioners have given portions of the county's Critical Areas growth allocation to a number of waterfront subdivisions in the region which could take advantage of new water and sewer service.

Additionally, the commissioners said last week they are willing to pay part of the engineering costs for developers who want to run water and sewer lines to new development.

So far, three developers have

## Green Thumb program retrains older workers for new careers

A workday for Jenny Lee Evans of Crisfield is typical of most receptionists. At the state Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation, she helps clients log onto the World Wide Web and complete application forms. She prepares letters, files paperwork and answers telephone queries.

Her work, though, sharply contrasts her last job at a family soda shop. There, workplace organization meant goods stacked in their rightful places, and advanced technology was a jingling 1960s-style cash register.

"It was a soda fountain, a sandwich shop," Evans said. "It was my husband's business, and it is still there. I worked there

after my husband died, about six years, until I got my daughter through college."

Now, at age 70, Evans is all but typical. While most people her age are retired, she arrives at DLLR each weekday morning at 8, where she is training for a career in office administration. The job, part time and suitable for a slowing lifestyle, is a stepping stone into a workforce from which she's been absent 34 years.

"At my age, to go back to work, I was a little nervous," Evans admits. "I was scared of a computer. I thought I'd lose everything (in the system). Now, I feel better about working. It's amusing to see the things you can do on a computer."

## Deputies arrest 6, seize drugs in Wilson Landing raid

The so-called "designer drug" Ecstasy, which previously had not been seen in Somerset County, was seized in an early morning raid Friday at Wilson Landing, a mobile home park outside Princess Anne.

"It's the first Ecstasy that we've found in the county that I'm aware of," said Chief Deputy Dan Harrison of the Somerset County Sheriff's Office.

Deputies arrested six people in the 2:30 a.m. raid at 30551 Bardwell Drive, and also seized crack cocaine, marijuana, drug paraphernalia and about \$300 in cash, Harrison said.

The raid ended a one-month investigation by the Sheriff's Office and the county's Narcotics Task Force at the trailer which was occupied by Elma Beth Greaser, 21, and Christopher Thomas McIntyre, 27.

In addition to Greaser and McIntyre, police also arrested Damon Tremayne Powell, 24, Melvin Eugene Fields Jr., 24, Kevin Damell Harmon, 21, and

Kyree Rene Jackson, 19, all of Snow Hill.

The four Snow Hill men were not part of the initial investigation, Harrison said.

"It just so happened that when we raided the place, the other four were there also," he said.

All six were charged with possession of marijuana, possession of crack cocaine, possession of Ecstasy and possession with intent to distribute all three drugs.

Greaser and McIntyre were also charged with possession of drug paraphernalia and maintaining a common nuisance.

All six were being held in the Somerset County Detention Center: Greaser on \$10,000 bond, McIntyre on \$100,000, Powell on \$100,000, Fields on \$100,000,

Harmon on \$100,000 and Jackson on \$75,000.

The Sheriff's Office was assisted by Maryland State Police, the Princess Anne Police Department K-9 Unit and the Somerset County Narcotics Task Force.

# Our encounter with Jesus

"But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb." Looking into the tomb, she saw two angels. "Why are you weeping?" they asked. "Because they have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." She was alone, so terribly alone.

Then Mary turned around and "saw Jesus standing, but she did not know it was Jesus."

"Woman, why are you weeping? Whom do you seek?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him."

He said to her, "Mary." Notice the redeeming features in that encounter: "Supposing him

to be the gardener." He met her on her level. Here is the heart of the gospel. He comes to us as a little child born of peasant parents in a barn. His brief appearance on the stage of history is in the role of an itinerant preacher. He walks along the seashore and calls people to follow him. He lived among them — and died — as one of them.

Our encounter with Jesus may also take place this way. He comes in the context of daily life and speaks a language we can understand: "Mary." The dimension of the eternal is made known to us in the commonplace, ordinary life.

Mary really did not find Jesus. Jesus found Mary. We do not find him, he finds us. He makes that unmistakably clear in the parables of the lost lamb, the lost coin, and the lost son. Even when we delib-

erately turn our backs upon him or, like Peter, deny that we ever knew him, he finds us. He risks his life for the missing lamb caught in the thicket. He searches every nook and cranny in the house until the missing coin is found. He comes as the waiting father with outstretched arms to forgive and welcome us home again. So much love, so much seeking and reconciling love is contained in that word "Mary." And what boundless joy is expressed in her simple reply, "Rabboni!" She ran from that encounter breathless with excitement to share the incredible news: "I have seen the Lord!"

To live is to choose. We can choose to ignore the resurrection or regard it as myth. But we will have an encounter with Jesus. How will yours be?

## Officials look for ferry funding

Although a ferry would be unlikely to see much use by daily commuters, according to the study, McClenahan said DOT officials see the ferry as a way to relieve heavy summer traffic on Route 50.

The complete study will collect data on service features and costs, conduct a cost analysis and assess land travel markets. Marsha Kaiser, the State Transportation Department's director of planning

and capital programming, is in charge of the study.

The study will also look at whether a ferry should be operated by the state or a private company.

In the meantime, Virginia officials are studying a similar plan to operate a ferry between Reedville on the western shore and either Onancock or Pungoteague Creeks in Accomack County.

A study done by the Northern Neck Planning Commission shows a ferry would pay for itself, although it could not recoup the cost of building ferry docks and

other infrastructure.

However, the study identified federal money for such construction through the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century, known as TEA-21. The grant would provide 80 percent of the necessary funding.

The findings in the Maryland and Virginia studies don't surprise McClenahan who said he thinks people are looking for ways to avoid driving on Interstate 95.

"There is a great need to bypass Baltimore and Washington," he said.

## Program retrains older workers

make up a growing number of older workers in the work place. Some are learning new skills after retirement. Others, like Evans, worked briefly or not at all, and are learning a skill for the first time. Most are on a fixed income and faced with escalating costs in living and medical services.

"Everything now costs so much," said Evans, a homeowner. "Social Security wouldn't pay for everything, and being unemployed, I had no hospital insurance. I had to pay on my own. I decided to go back to work."

DLLR, a job service agency in Crisfield, was in the middle of a hiring freeze when Evans went there in search of a job. Through Green Thumb Inc., DLLR hired Evans and is training her in office administration.

With funding from the U.S. Department of Labor, Green

Thumb pays Evans' salary, enabling her to receive paid training. The program also affords agencies like DLLR an opportunity to hire with no budget impact. After a year, employers are encouraged to hire Green Thumb workers as regular employees.

Under Title 5 of the Older Americans Act, the concept of Green Thumb started in 1965 to aid rural farm workers with limited incomes. Today the program operates in 44 states and Puerto Rico, providing senior citizens age 55 and older a chance at skills training and employment. The program also has an e-commerce web site, Geezer.com, where senior citizens can sell handcrafted products.

"Don't discount seniors; they're reliable and dependable," says Rosalee Ayers, a Green Thumb field operations assistant for Somerset and surrounding counties. "People think that seniors miss a lot of days with arthritis or things like that. But that's a myth."

Ayers, over age 55 herself, was a skilled clerical worker until a disability slowed her. "I was looking for something to supplement my income, and I was offered a job as a field operations assistant," said Ayers, who joined the agency in 1998. "I enjoy being able to place seniors in job training. I'd be in a wheelchair or an insane asylum thinking about my ailments if I weren't doing this."

She said the Maryland program, which started in 1978, has placed more than 300 people in more than 200 job sites. She currently oversees 27 participants in Somerset, Worcester and Caroline counties.

"Some people came from Campbell Soup or Perdue picking chickens, and didn't have any skills," Ayers said. "Now some of them are sitting at a desk performing. People are really surprised at what they can do."

Dan Church, a job services specialist at DLLR, said the busy, but

limited staffed agency serves an average of 100 walk-ins weekly, mostly Somerset County residents in search of employment. In addition, countless written correspondences and telephone calls are handled daily. Evans, he says, responds to much of the workload.

"Some 15 people can come in some days, 30 on others, and she handles most of them," he says. "She posts letters, weighs mail and assists people with the operating of computers. She's learned people skills and receptionist skills. I'm gray-headed, and I'd be bald-headed if I did all that she does."

Evans sees her work as a chance at a permanent, skilled position. "I came here to train and hopefully the company can take me on," she said.

Ayers agrees. "The next step after training is going out in the job sector to work in a job that is not subsidized, that pays more than minimum wage," said Ayers, adding that last year, seven local participants found permanent jobs. "They called, and I don't know anyone else so happy."

inquired about hooking up to water and sewer, according to Jack Willing Jr., an attorney for the Sanitary Commission.

The engineering costs to these areas could be sizeable. Willing said.

"If the developers can't afford it, there won't be any new development in the county," he said.

The cost is expected to run about \$3,000 for a new McCready outpatient center in Princess Anne, \$5,000 for a proposed mobile home park on West Post Office Road and \$7,500 to \$10,000 for a proposed retirement community on Anderson Road, according to Robin Smetz, manager of the county Sanitary District.

The engineering studies will give developers estimated costs of their projects, Street said.

Although the commissioners said they would be willing to pay engineering costs, the developers would have to pay for construction, which would have to include lines big enough to handle other users along the way.

Running water and sewer into areas outside town will allow for more growth in an underpopulated county with a small tax base, the commissioners said.

"The county needs development," said Commissioner Phillip Gerald. "If that means we have to fund preliminary engineering, then we have to do it."

# Restaurant offers fine food, art

After surviving over five decades and eating in restaurants on two of the continents, I can personally critique some of the foods that have passed this pallet. We all could.

For instance, the best cream of crab soup that I have ever tasted was made with Maryland blue crab and served in hand-painted bowls

Stained glass windows that cover over half a wall, limited edition prints, duck stamp prints with pencil and color remarques, original paintings, and the finest collection of porcelain oyster plates imaginable — not to mention the decoys, model boats, vinegar cruets, photographs, and an electric train suspended from the ceiling running through two rooms.

An outside rock garden with waterfall only adds to the ambiance. To be an extraordinary chef requires years of training. A collection of art such as found here requires a lifetime commitment — perhaps over several generations — even after a fire in by-gone years.

I found myself thinking as I introduced the cuisine and art to a life-long friend recently, that art like love and marriage (at least in most of my generation and earlier)

is a life-long commitment. Either you love it or you don't. You are committed or you're not. You buy it or you don't.

The owners of this establishment definitely bought it and have generously put an exquisite collection on display for all to see. No matter how many decades you have lived, you owe it to yourself to enjoy the artistic offerings at one of the Eastern Shore's finest restaurants. The artistic presentations inside, outside, and on the table are a delight.

## RECIPE BOX by Shirley W. Richards

### Lamb Pinwheels

- Boned breast of lamb, about 3-1/2 pounds
- 3/4 pound bulk pork sausage
- 2 tablespoons fat
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 teaspoon pepper
- 1 small onion (sliced)
- 1 can tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

Have the lamb breast boned.

spread with bulk pork sausage, rolled and tied, or skewered into shape at the market. Wipe the meat with a damp cloth and dry. Then brown on all sides in hot fat. Pour off the fat in the pan, leaving 2 tablespoons only. Season the roll with salt and pepper, add sliced onion, tomatoes and Worcester shire sauce. Cover tightly and cook very slowly until done, about 1-1/2 hours. Slice into "pinwheels" using a very sharp knife. Serves 5.

### State needs to speed up bay ferry study

The fact that a feasibility study to run a car ferry between Crisfield and Point Lookout in St. Mary's County is still ongoing after more than a year can only be interpreted as good news by proponents of the idea.

The study by state transportation and economic development officials has already identified a need for a ferry that would provide another means of access to people wanting to visit the Eastern Shore.

Now state officials are looking to see if federal transportation money is available to subsidize a ferry in the winter months when the number of visitors decreases.

Virginia officials, who are currently conducting a similar study for a proposed ferry between Reedville on the western shore and Accomack County, have also identified a need for such transportation, and they have also identified a way to pay for construction of ferry docks and other infrastructure.

The question now is whether there is enough need for two ferries operating in close proximity.

Maryland officials need to speed up their study and get their boat in the water before Virginia beats them to it.

A ferry that docks in Crisfield would mean a huge boost to the economy in a town that has fallen on hard times since the decline of the seafood industry by bringing in tourism dollars and spawning new support businesses on both sides of the bay.

Look at what happened to Kent Island since the Chesapeake Bay Bridge opened in the early 1950s and it isn't hard to imagine that Crisfield could once again become a major contributor to Maryland's economy.

As I have traveled throughout Somerset County and visited the various areas that make up this great community, I sometimes think about what most people consider economic development to be.

To others, it may signify the uprooting of pristine land to accommodate new development and growth at the expense of the environment.

Has anyone heard of "redevelopment?"

Redevelopment is, simply put, a better phrase than urban renewal, the catch word that came out of Washington that was to rebuild

In rural areas like Somerset County where most of the people live in small farming or fishing communities and we have two designated municipalities, Princess Anne and Crisfield, urban renewal carries the meaning of "Main Street Revitalization" exactly what the town of Princess Anne is in the midst of doing right now with Steetscape.

The city of Crisfield, I know in the past and hopefully in the future, has also looked into the possibility of redoing "downtown" with the goal of bringing back the idea of small town America where people could venture to shop and visit with friends and neighbors right in their own backyards.

How many of us remember the country singer Alan Jackson's song "The Little Man" where he sings of how small town America's main streets are being eliminated by the huge strip shopping and malls that have drawn

the people away from small town America to the huge commercial enterprises that have sprung up all over our land. I am not totally opposed to such ventures. I just think about what could have happened if those very same ventures were able to take place in the heart of small town America. I think of such an enterprise as not economic development, but economic redevelopment.

When I was a town manager, my greatest joy was in seeing someone with ambition take a run down building that had character and turn it into a successful business. I saw a lot of that in Rock Hall, Md. I see that happening in Princess Anne. There are tremendous opportunities in Crisfield for this very thing to occur. In fact, I know redevelopment has occurred in Crisfield, but we all know more still needs to be done.

Redevelopment is a good thing. No, redevelopment is a great thing! It makes use of what is there already being provided in the way of public infrastructure.

It can raze abandoned buildings that are no longer useful and replace them with newer more amenable structures that can blend into the community.

Redevelopment can resurrect that good old community spirit that seems to be leaving us at times. Redevelopment can create and retain jobs, increase the property tax rolls, and makes us proud of our communities again.

Redevelopment can be small town, and it can be rural. We do not always have to destroy the village to save it. We can utilize what our forefathers have left to us and build upon it and make it better for our children.

Now, can anyone tell me that that is not exciting? Look for this EDC to promote rural redevelopment as much as possible. It is the future for Somerset County.

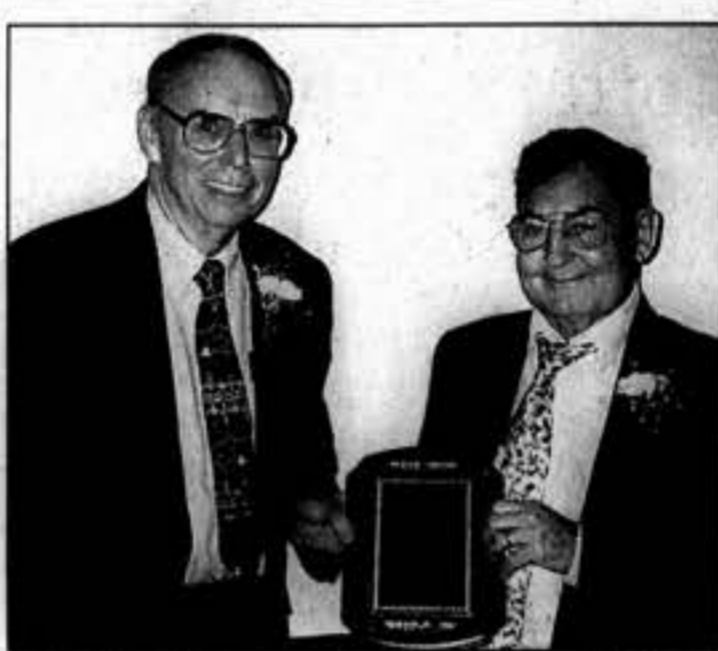

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Bush budget includes money for Md. projects

U.S. Rep. Wayne T. Gilchrest (R-Maryland-1st) praised President George W. Bush's first budget for including many important projects for Maryland, including several on the Lower Shore such as Assateague Island and Smith Island. The details of Bush's budget were released in Washington April 9 and include \$76 million in funding for water resource projects along Maryland's rivers and waterways. It also includes \$52.7 million to fund Maryland's environmental protection efforts, and \$6.7 million to help conserve Maryland's natural resources - a 281 percent increase over current funding levels. "We've usually had to fight for money from Congress for these priorities, and it's nice to know that the administration is with us on many of these items," Gilchrest said. "This is great for our district and we look forward to ensuring that they get funded this year."

Island National Seashore to continue the beach restoration project there. That \$17.2 million project received \$2.5 million last year and is set to begin this fall. It involves widening the beach with sand pumped from the ocean floor. Other highlights include: \$300,000 to help protect Martin National Wildlife Refuge on Smith Island; \$450,000 for maintenance dredging of the Wicomico River; \$1.5 million for Chesapeake Bay Oyster Recovery efforts; \$2.798 million for maintenance dredging of Ocean City Harbor, Inlet and Sinepuxent Bay; \$736,000 for navigational dredging from Rhodes Point to Tylerton on Smith Island; \$865,000 for maintenance dredging of the Nanticoke River. The president's budget now goes to Congress and will be used as a guide as members of the House and Senate consider their own budget and spending priorities.

Duck blind license application packets mailed

The Department of Natural Resources has mailed out licensing application packages to riparian shoreline owners, agents and tenants, who licensed stationary blinds or blind sites during the 2000-2001 license year. Riparian landowners can license their entire shoreline on a single application, regardless of the size as long as it is continuous. Any shoreline which is not licensed by the owner, agent or tenants, will be available for the public to license later this summer. If you are riparian shoreline owner or agent and did not license a stationary blind or blind site during the 2000-2001 license year, or if you did but do not receive an application package by mid-April, please contact the DNR's Wildlife

& Heritage Division at 410-260-8540. You must be able to provide the department with your complete name and address, and, if you are the agent or tenant, the complete name and address of the shoreline owner. Once you receive the application package, it must be completed and returned, by mail, by June 1, to Duck Blind Licenses, DNR Wildlife and Heritage Division, 580 Taylor Ave., Annapolis, MD 21401. The licenses will be stamped in the order in which they are received. Dates and locations for the open licensing period for residents of Maryland who wish to license a blind site as a non-landowner will be announced in June.

Rockfish tournament planned for June 8-10

The sixth annual Rock Fish Tournament is scheduled for June 8, 9, and 10, at the bulkhead in Rock Hall Harbor. The town of Rock Hall is located in Kent County on Maryland's Eastern Shore, and is named after the Maryland state fish, (Rock Fish.) The Tournament is a Pro-Am Event and is open to private anglers and licensed fishing guides. Entry fees are \$100 per day per boat and \$125 for licensed fishing guides, with or without a charter. The prize purse remains the largest around with a \$10,000 First Prize, \$5,000 Second Prize, and a \$3,000 Third Prize, with additional cash prizes and youth division trophies. p.m., at the Rock Hall Harbor each day. 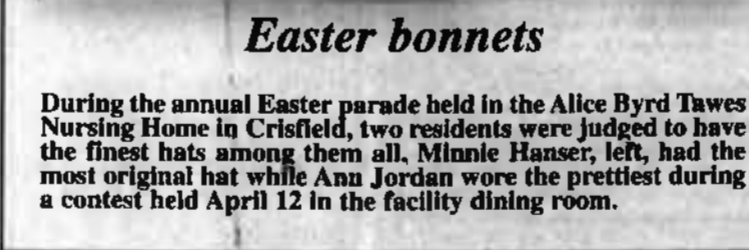

## Endoscopic Brow Lift

As we age, our bodies change. Perhaps nowhere is that more visible than in our faces. Sun exposure, smoking, genetics and gravity all combine as factors in the facial aging process. Some of us will opt for surgery to cosmetically alter the effects of growing older. Others will choose a similar solution for medical or functional reasons other than mere aesthetics. For each, a relatively new procedure, Endoscopic Brow Lift, is being performed at Peninsula Regional Medical Center to combat a specific facial condition called Brow Ptosis or the "drooping" of the brow.

Brow Ptosis occurs when the skin of the brow, or forehead, descends or droops due to the natural process of aging, creating wrinkle lines on the forehead and between the eyebrows. "Endoscopic Brow Lift is used to surgically elevate the forehead skin and upper eyelids," said Jason T. Arrington, MD, the lower shore's only plastic and reconstructive surgeon performing the procedure. "The goal is to raise the skin of the brow, providing a more youthful appearance of 10 to 15 years earlier."

Endoscopic Brow Lift is performed by creating three small incisions within the hair-bearing region of the scalp. Doing the surgery endoscopically—using a small camera under the skin to guide the surgeon—allows Dr. Arrington to gain access to the area without the traditional open and large incision in the scalp. During the 60 to 90 minute, operating room based, outpatient surgery, Dr. Arrington will release the soft tissue (muscle and skin) of the forehead and brow and actually slide it back up toward the hairline. He then removes the muscles that act to pull the brow down. By eliminating those muscles, other muscles, which pull the brow up, will take control and serve as natural "elevators" to keep the brow raised. The result is a more youthful look and the elimination or dramatic reduction of vertical wrinkle lines. "The point is not to make someone look like a different person but rather to reverse some of the effects of the aging process," added Dr. Arrington. "This is not a surgery for a person who wants to completely change their overall appearance. The result is a patient having a more rested, wide-awake appearance."

While Endoscopic Brow Lift is a surgery that can benefit both men and women, most of Dr. Arrington's patients have been female and have chosen the surgery for cosmetic reasons. It does, however, have a medical application proven most beneficial to male patients. As men age, the brow can droop so severely that skin overlapping the eyes—a condition known as "hooding"—can dangerously reduce a person's peripheral vision. Endoscopic Brow Lift has been very beneficial in correcting this condition, which is customarily and initially diagnosed by the patient's ophthalmologist or optometrist.

In addition, recent studies have demonstrated that this same procedure can reduce or eliminate migraine headaches. Dr. Arrington is currently working with Peninsula Regional neurologists to evaluate migraine patients who might benefit from the procedure.

For either functional or cosmetic reasons, recovery from the surgery is much less painful and quicker when performed endoscopically. "Whenever incisions are made, small sensory nerves are cut," stated Dr. Arrington. "With an open procedure, the numbness around the incisions is more profound and recovery takes several weeks. Endoscopically, it's much less painful and patients recover in about half the time."

In addition, most insurance companies will not cover the surgery if performed strictly for cosmetic reasons. ## One Patient, Two Lifesaving Surgeries

When William T. Skipper (Skip) of Trappe, Maryland woke up with chest pain on Sunday, February 4, he had no idea he would have major surgery twice within the next two weeks. He didn't want to worry Connie, his wife of 42 years, so he waited to see if it would go away. When it didn't go away, he told Connie and she called 911. Skip was taken to Shore Memorial Hospital in Easton.

On Monday, Dr. Bruce Helmsley performed a diagnostic catheterization and discovered two medical emergencies: Skip needed open heart surgery for severely clogged arteries and surgery to remove a large Aortic Abdominal Aneurysm or AAA, which is life threatening if it bursts. Dr. Helmsley discussed where he could go for treatment but Skip was adamant about going to Peninsula Regional Medical Center. "I was born and raised on the Shore and I didn't want to leave the Shore," Connie added. "We had heard fantastic things about the heart services at Peninsula Regional through word of mouth so we were very much at peace with our decision."

Dr. Steve Julian of CV Surgical Associates, P.A. was consulted, who scheduled open heart surgery immediately. Transferred to Peninsula Regional on Tuesday, Skip underwent a triple bypass Wednesday morning. By Friday he was walking the halls and "knocked the socks off of everyone in Physical Therapy he did so well." Connie and their two sons were not surprised. Skip, a hard worker and active man, had no thoughts of retirement—he was still working full time at age 69 as a plumber.

Because he was doing so well, surgery to repair the aneurysm was set up for the following Thursday, February 15, using technology that is only being used in major medical centers across the country. Dr. Julian, Dr. Nicholas Ogburn, and Dr. Michael Marks, interventional radiologist, performed an AAA endovascular repair. While traditional treatment requires major surgery and a large incision, the endovascular procedure requires two small incisions in the groin. Using an X-ray imaging device, a catheter containing a vascular graft is guided up through a blood vessel in the patient's groin into the aorta and the graft is placed inside the aneurysm.

Dr. Julian says, "Normally these two surgeries would have been performed months apart, increasing the risk of Skip's aneurysm rupturing. But this new technology is less invasive, presenting less surgical trauma to the patient, which allowed us to take care of the second problem expeditiously."

Skip, who left the hospital three days later, is at home recovering nicely and anxious to get back to work. Connie, who barely left his side at Peninsula Regional, says, "We experienced medical care and professionalism to the highest degree and always with a smile. On a scale of 1-10, we'd give them 1,000. I just thank God for this hospital, and the doctors and nurses who took care of him. For us, it was a double miracle."

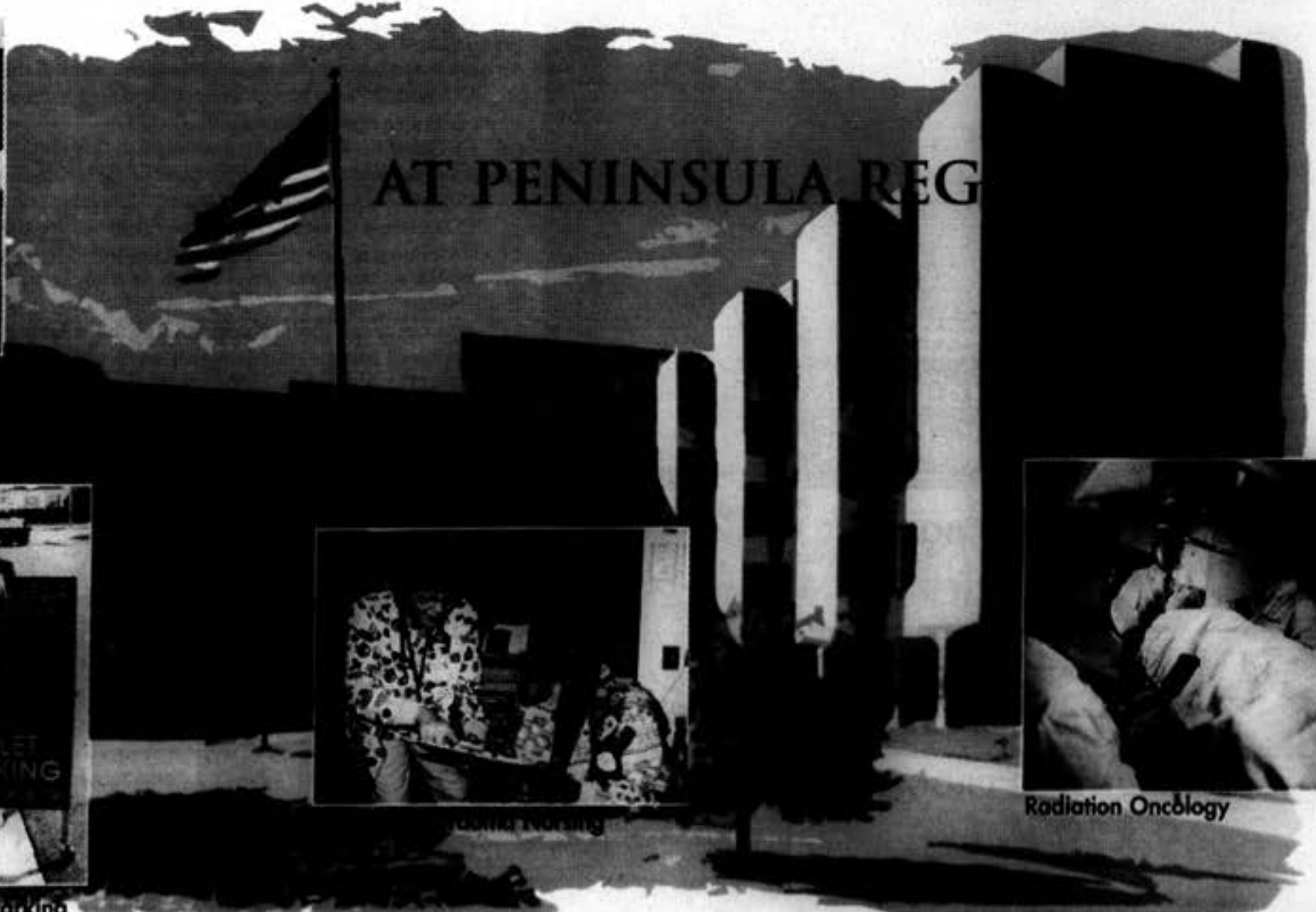

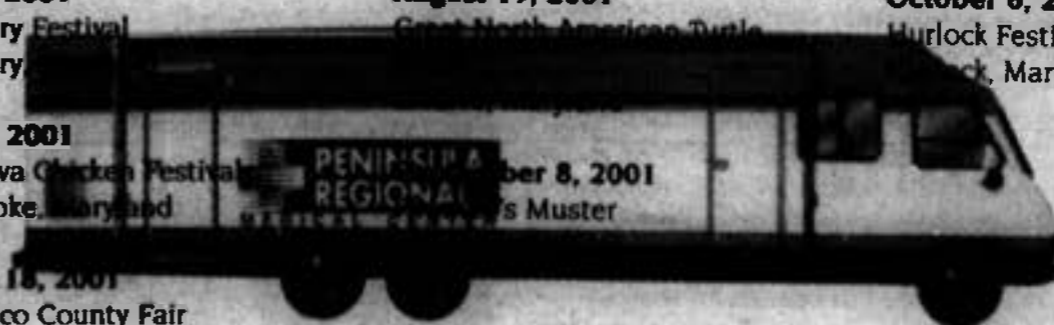

## Town condemns former clam plant

State environmental inspectors took samples of chemicals, standing water and other substances from an abandoned clam processing plant Monday after Princess Anne officials condemned the property that has been vandalized and used by neighborhood children as a meeting place.

The results of the lab tests are expected sometime next week.

Town Manager John O'Meara called in the Maryland Department of the Environment to inspect the former home of Shellfish Seafood Ltd. after town police entered the

building and discovered what O'Meara called "a very disturbing situation."

Bags of aluminum sulphate and a crystalline substance that may be salt remain in the building, exposed to the wind and rain that enter through a partially collapsed roof.

Additionally, there are several large storage tanks on the 3.3-acre site with unknown contents, O'Meara said.

The interior walls of the building are covered with spray painted graffiti, indicating children have been going inside over a long period of time.

"Our immediate concern is with the kids," O'Meara said. "It looks like a clubhouse."

The building, which has been abandoned for several years, has since been placed under police surveillance, he said.

Previous letters regarding the property sent to owner Leroy Truex of Manahawken, N.J., have gone unanswered, although Truex has continued to pay property taxes each year, O'Meara said.

A civil citation that requires Truex to appear in District Court was mailed this week.

## Board eyes ways to realign schools

By DEBORAH GATES

Facing a steady decline in student enrollment, Somerset County school officials are again tackling the issue of school realignment, and this time are considering a plan to combine middle and high school students in order to reduce expenses by closing buildings under capacity.

"We need to look at the fewest number of buildings that the board would have to fund," Superintendent Michael Thomas told members of the school board last week.

School board members at last week's board meeting called for discussions on what they call a "6-12 arrangement," a middle-high school concept that would combine grades six through 12 in both Crisfield and Princess Anne in a move that would reduce the number of school buildings by at least two. The plan would also combine grades pre-kindergarten through five at schools in the northern and southern parts of the county.

A meeting to examine the "6-12 arrangement" and other realignment scenarios will be held May 2 at a 7 p.m. work session at the Board of Education offices in Westover.

Discussions to realign schools come on the heels of the board's adoption of a 2002 budget, for which it is seeking \$21.4 million in funding for next year. Of that amount, formally approved at the meeting, the panel wants county approval on \$10.1 million in rev-

## Liquor board shuts down Greenwood night spot

Following nearly three years of investigation, police closed a popular Greenwood tavern April 15.

The temporary shutdown of Darnell's Rainbow Inn was apparently sealed at an April 11 meeting of the Somerset County Board of License Commissioners.

Several agencies, including Maryland State Police, the Somerset County Sheriff's Office, Princess Anne Police Department, the Maryland State Fire Marshal's Office, Maryland

Comptroller's Office and the Somerset County Board of Health presented evidence at the hearing, according to a statement issued last week by state police.

The investigating agencies allege tavern managers sold alcohol from containers which were refilled from other containers which lacked liquor board proof of purchase stickers.

Investigators also allege the tavern is a "continuing nuisance to the neighborhood," which is within the Princess Anne HotSpot area.

Police also said they received numerous complaints that the

Rainbow Inn was a center of contraband distribution, gambling and delivery of alcohol to minors.

According to the police statement, numerous arrests have been made on the premises in the past.

The owner of the establishment, Darnell Doane, was fined \$2,000 in connection with the alleged violations. The earliest the Rainbow Inn can reopen is mid-June. The investigation of the tavern began in 1998.

# The sin of making excuses

The first sin. You remember the story. Adam and Eve were living in a place so ideal it was called Eden. One day a spectacular visitor, the serpent, struck up a conversation with Eve. The serpent raised a question about the goodness of God, and then an accusation: God refuses you this particular fruit because God knows you will become equal to the Divine if you eat it.

So Eve was convinced, and she ate. And being generous by nature, she shared the fruit with her husband, and he ate. And that was the first sin.

The Bible, in its profound wis-

dom, portrays the first sin in symbolic language. If it had described the sin specifically, we humans would ever after have thought that act to be the worst sin and probably the only one to worry about.

The first sin is the basic act of disobedience and disbelief. As such it is the essence of our human problem. This first sin is highly significant. The scriptures and human experience both testify that God has provided a remedy for the first sin, no matter what it is. But the second sin can make God's remedy ineffective. It is the sin of excuses — the unwillingness to admit that we are wrong and the refusal to see ourselves for what we are.

When we become guilty of the second sin — the sin of excusing

ourselves and of being unwilling to face ourselves — we close the door against God and hope. The prophets called it the judgment of God, but it is written into the very nature of the universe. Either we face ourselves and repent, or our world falls. Mistakes don't destroy us, nor will the eternal mistakes called sins. What destroys is our inability to face ourselves and confess that we've been wrong.

God can visit the penitent soul because the penitent soul has an open door. But God is shut out of the life that covers over its failures with a hard surface of excuses.

Whatever we do with this life, whatever course we follow, let us be sure that we don't die making excuses.

enues, with the balance coming from state funding.

Thomas has warned other officials of a possible slash in state funding for 20-year renovations for schools that are under utilized. Westover, Woodson and Deal Island elementary schools and Washington High are currently eligible for 20-year renovations but proposals have not been submitted "because for the past two years the board has been looking at the realignment issue," Thomas said in an interview last week.

Washington High School in Princess Anne, for example, with a state-approved capacity for 900 students, currently operates at just over half capacity with 480 students. Crisfield High in Crisfield, currently with 350 students, is

more than halfway below its 750-student capacity.

The Board of Education has been grappling with ways to trim waste and reduce the number of unnecessary school buildings since the controversial proposal to consolidate the two high schools was opposed by a majority of county voters during a straw poll last November.

At the board's request, Thomas last week introduced realignment figures that would bring building enrollments in line with state requirements for 80 percent in 20-year renovation funds.

Major issues regarding the 6-12 arrangement include the mixing of younger students with older ones, and board members said they are concerned with housing 11-year-olds and 20-year-olds in the same building.

"I would like to look at other

options," Jack Willing Jr. told fellow board members. "I'm not sure if this is the way to go."

While most members favor consolidation in general, they split on the issue of banning high school consolidation from upcoming realignment talks — and at last week's meeting voted 3-2 to bar any discussion on the centralization issue.

Board member John Paul motioned for the ban. "Voters voted not to do it, and I want it deleted from consolidation discussions."

Paul and board members Betty Miles and James Byrd voted in support of the ban. Willing, who along with Chairman Richard Scott voted against it, arguing that all possible realignment scenarios should be considered.

onship at Cole Field House.

After winning the championship, Collins appeared to be headed to College Park, but failed to get attain a score on the SAT that met the National Collegiate Athletic Association standards.

Romaine Collins said her son had received a score of 820 on his SATs, but needed an 840. When he took the test again earlier this month, he scored an 880, which qualified him to attend Maryland.

If Gary Williams recruited him — and Maryland doesn't make many mistakes, they probably got themselves a very good basketball player," said Morgan Wooten, the Hall of Fame basketball coach of DeMatha Catholic High School near College Park.

Collins will have no problem lighting up the scoreboard if Coach Williams needs a spark off

of the bench next season. As a senior for Crisfield, he averaged 30.5 points, 9.9 assists, 5.1 steals and 4.9 rebounds a game.

FoxSports.com college basketball analyst Jacey Zemball said he thinks that Collins can come in and contribute for Williams next season.

"He is an ultra-quick point guard who can run the offense, he makes sound decisions on the fast break, and is a solid outside shooter," he said. "His small stature (5 feet 9 inches, 180 pounds) will hurt him on the defensive end, but at an up-tempo type of college, he'll hurt the opposing team more than his own."

Phil Rayfield, Collins' high school coach, thinks that his old star will fit in nicely.

"I think that he can be a big time contributor," he said. "He has something about him that Steve Blake and Drew Nicholas don't have."

Thomas Davis, principal at Crisfield High, said that, even with his previous academic struggles, Collins will excel both on the hardwood and in the classroom.

"Andre has a wonderful opportunity," he said. "He is going to play for a powerhouse ACC school, which is also a fine academic institution. I'm really glad they were as patient as they were with Andre."

With big money available in the National Basketball Association, Davis thinks that Collins would be better off and gain experience on the court and obtain his degree.

"His focus is to go there and play basketball, but, more importantly, to get a degree," Davis said.

"Basketball is a game of numbers, and very few players go pro. But if Andre can get a degree, that will be with him for the rest of his life."

## County begins Manokin study

Somerset County has undertaken a study of the Manokin River Watershed with the intent to develop an "action strategy" for the conservation and restoration of the river.

This work is to be accomplished in partnership with the Maryland Department of Natural Resources and is funded through a grant from the Coastal Zone Management Program (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.)

The strategy is designed to first assess the existing characteristics of the river and then to develop goals with local citizens that aim at environmental restoration and further development of the Manokin as a resource for the citizens of the county.

As a start, a steering committee made up of local and state agencies has met to go over the information currently available from the State and other sources and to question the gaps that are noted.

The Maryland Conservation Corps stationed in Parsonsburg has begun a stream walk along the river to begin to relate what is visually occurring on the Manokin versus what the scientific reports and models have shown.

Once the walks are complete and compiled in a report, the county and Steering Committee will organize a meeting to present it to interested property owners and local citizens. Initial project goals include the review of potential "Greenways," review of the County Recreation Plan in relation

to the watershed, coordination with any TMDL requirements that might come down from the state and EPA, and actively seeking opportunities for local property owners, as well as potential mitigation sites or pilot projects.

However, the final direction of the project will rely to a large extent on the interest of citizens and their involvement.

Since this grant will not result in regulations, it offers an opportunity for Somerset County to make use of federal funding to develop a plan that will be advantageous for property owners and the county in general in maintaining the Manokin as an economic as well as environmental resource to benefit all citizens.

As the lead agency, the Somerset County Department of Technical and Community Services invites your interest in this project. It is our hope that there will be, in fact, real public involvement so that the product is useful.

The first meeting will be organized and well advertised locally once the results from the stream walk have been documented.

1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon allspice  
1 teaspoon ginger

3 teaspoons baking soda  
Sift together, then blend together:

3/4 cup Crisco shortening  
1 egg  
1 cup sugar  
1/4 cup molasses

Combine both sets of ingredients together. Make into 1-1/2 balls, roll in sugar. Bake in 350 degree oven 8 to 10 minutes on foil covered, ungreased cookie sheet. Dough can be made 2 or 3 days ahead - store in plastic bags in refrigerator. When ready to bake, take out to room temperature. And, Enjoy!

**Condemnations are a good start**

Last week's condemnation of two Princess Anne buildings and a citation on a third should come as good news to others who take pride in their properties.

For too long, derelict — and in some cases dangerous — structures have been allowed to ruin the appearance of an otherwise attractive small town whose claims to fame are its historic buildings, quaint streets and boxwood gardens.

Visitors who come to town looking for these things on the self-guided walking tour — and there are a lot of them in the summer months — also get to see the seedier side of Princess Anne where a building with a collapsed roof or one with no paint sit in close proximity to well kept, attractive properties.

The fact that the town's actions against these property owners coincided with the approaching completion of Streetscape is probably no accident.

Aside from the fact that the project proved the town was serious about improving its appearance, the newly spruced-up downtown area and fresh paving along Somerset Avenue only made these buildings stand out as eyesores even more than they did before.

While the two condemned buildings are probably the worst examples in town of dangerous and derelict properties, there are still plenty more in need of serious attention.

With the arrival of warm weather, tall grass and weeds will soon become problems at some properties, so town officials will have their hands full trying to keep up with both seasonal and year-round code offenses.

The town's first round of citations in Operation Clean Sweep is a good start to a problem that has plagued Princess Anne for years. We hope officials can keep it up until the job is finished.

**SOMERSET SOUNDINGS**

The news is out! The Washington Redskins will not be coming to Somerset County, at least not for the next few years. The Redskins brass has decided to go back to Carlisle, Pa., to conduct the team's summer camp.

Well, we gave it the "good old college try!" Even though we were not successful this time, the fact that we made the invitation was exciting in itself. I have always told folks that if you do not believe in a dream, then how can you expect one to come true?

In the case of trying to get the Redskins to look at Somerset County for summer camp, I think if we had been in the hunt earlier, we may have had a better chance. As it turns out, the initial favorite location, at William and Mary in Virginia lost out as well as at least five other considerations.

In economic development, however, we do not place all our hopes on one lead or project. The possibility of having an upscale retirement community built in the county is still very much alive. In fact, this potential project has already received the endorsement of the Somerset County EDC as one of our top priority items to pursue.

We are monitoring closely the studies being conducted on the ferry project possibly to run from Crisfield to Point Lookout in St. Mary's County which if implemented would be a tremendous boon to economic growth on the Lower Shore.

I have been involved in two ferry projects since coming to Maryland in 1986, and from my experience, if done right, they can be very successful.

I have been in several meetings with other EDC and tourism officials, and all eyes are beginning to look at Somerset County as the center for the growing "ecotourism" business that is being promoted by the state and various marketing consultants who specialize in this field.

We are situated perfectly for this type of industry. The EDC

has this on our plate as well.

This past week I was invited along with my state/county counterparts to attend a luncheon meeting with the Secretary of the Department of Business and Economic Development, or DBED, as we call it, to hear the latest news of what they state can help us with in promoting our counties for business growth.

One program that has received great news is the Local Revolving Loan Fund Program. If you remember in a previous column I wrote that the SCEDC was planning to request grant funds from DBED to help fund our local business revolving loan program. For every dollar we invested in the program, the state would match our dollar with a dollar of grant funds.

Well, the General Assembly in this past session, passed a law that would for counties like Somerset, increase the state's grant portion from a one-to-one match, to a one-to-two match. That is, for every dollar we put in, the state will double it. This is terrific news!

If we get approved in the grant process, we could go from a fund of \$90,000 to a fund of \$250,000. What that means is the SCEDC, along with other participating financial lending institutions, can assist companies with more loans and bigger loans. Now that is a great business growth incentive. Look for this to happen after July 1 when the new law and criteria take effect.

Before I sign off for the week, I would like to announce that the SCEDC has a new administrative secretary, LeeAnn Martin, who hails from Crisfield.

LeeAnn began with us on April 9, and it's great to have her on board. Well, that's it for now. See you all next week!

**Lung Association begins local campaign**

The American Lung Association of Maryland is launching a targeted social marketing campaign, "Tobacco Smoke Hurts My Asthma," in Somerset County. The campaign is aimed at parents and guardians who smoke and who have children with asthma. The objective is to reduce the exposure to secondhand smoke of children with asthma.

Secondhand smoke is a trigger of asthma, and causes respiratory problems in even healthy children. "During the first five years of life, healthy children whose parents smoke show a higher frequency of chronic

coughs, ear infections, nasal and chest congestion, in comparison to those children whose parents do not smoke," said Dr. Robert Chasse, spokesman for the Lung Association. "This campaign is designed to make the parents of children with asthma aware of the effects tobacco smoke can have on their child. Passive tobacco smoke is not only a primary trigger of asthma, it can actually cause the condition in non-asthmatic children."

As part of the program, a brochure that educates parents about the contents of tobacco smoke will be avail-

able to the public. The brochure will also be distributed to children who participate in American Lung Association pediatric asthma programs, through physicians' offices, and health departments.

A "smoke-free pledge" card encourages parents to protect their children. When the pledge card is returned to the Lung Association, the signer will receive two static cling stickers that say "Children breathing. Please don't smoke here." The stickers can be posted on windows or doors of the home or a vehicle.

"Children are often unwillingly

exposed to secondhand smoke," said Chasse. "Their lungs are underdeveloped and overly sensitive to air pollutants such as secondhand smoke, making them prime targets for respiratory problems, especially children with asthma. We all have a responsibility to protect our most vulnerable assets, our children and our future."

More than 5,000 children on the Eastern Shore have asthma.

## PRMC offers class for grandparents

## HEALTHFUL HINTS

Let's face it. We like things easy. That's why there's fast food, and remote control channel changers. Most people don't think of physical activity as "easy" though. We tell ourselves that it's hard and time-consuming. It involves sweat and discomfort. Negative thoughts and excuses are going to keep you sitting still. They provide little desire to move at all. But when you make a firm decision to begin adding physical activities, your new lifestyle will happen. First you have to get your head ready and overcome exercise excuses.

The Heart Health Program at the Somerset County Health Department strongly encourages physical activity to help reduce the risks of heart attacks, stroke, obesity and diabetes. Here are some of the most common excuses people give health care providers for not exercising. Karla Beardsley, registered dietitian at the Somerset County Health Department, has provided a positive response to help change your thinking if these are your excuses for not exercising.

**"I don't have time"**  
All it takes is a minimum of 20 to 30 minutes of moderate exertion (aerobic exercise) 3 days a week to stay in reasonable shape.

Take 10 minutes from your usual TV watching and 10 minutes of your "down" time and you'll be set.

**"I don't have the energy"**  
Most people who go for a brisk walk say that it makes them "feel full of energy." That's why they do it. It gets their blood circulating and their muscles moving, and is an ideal way to work off frustrations and stress. It can clear your mind of the day's problems. In this way it serves to supply you with more energy.

**"I always get sore"**  
Sore muscles come from doing too much, too fast, too soon. Start a routine of every-other-day exercise where you concentrate on gradually increasing time rather than pace. Be sure to get blood to your muscles first with a warm-up and then stretch out used muscles when you are done.

**"Exercise is boring"**  
See what you can do to make it stimulating for you. Vary your walking route, set your exercycle up so you can watch the evening news, join with a friend to walk at lunch, dance to your favorite music, treat yourself to a new brightly colored T-shirt, etc! Your mind is your limit for creativity.

**"I have arthritis"**  
Your doctor will probably have no objections to swimming or

cycling as an appropriate exercise. People with arthritis can exercise with caution and it is actually part of your treatment plan to help improve blood flow to damaged tissues. Call the health department to find out about PACE exercise programs and water exercise programs in Somerset County.

**"I weigh too much"**  
Start with something easy like a walk for five minutes. Turn around and go back. Do that for a week. Next week try to go a few more minutes and so on. See how much better you feel. Be sure to check the condition of your shoes because they cushion the impact of your weight and protect your joints.

**"I don't know what to do with the kids"**  
Take them with you, if possible. They need exercise too. It's a wonderful way to spend time together. You are a role model and children will do as you do, more than do what you say!

**"I've tried exercise programs but never stick with it"**  
This time you will. Think positively! Twenty minutes, three times a week or every other day is no big deal. Making exercise a top priority and allowing it to become a habit is the key. Set aside a time of day that is least likely to be interrupted by your work or family responsibilities. You owe it to the people you love - your family and friends to take time to be physically active.

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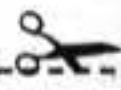
